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1 (Proceedings commenced at 10:12 a.m.)

2 MS. JONES: Good morning again. My name is  
3 Sharon Jones, and I'm pleased to open the meeting of the  
4 Grants, Budget, and Reporting Committee of the board of  
5 the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority. It is  
6 10:12 a.m., and I am now calling the committee meeting  
7 for July 15th, 2024, to order.

8 I have to note for the record that the  
9 public notice of this meeting containing all items on  
10 the agenda was filed with the secretary of state on  
11 July 1st, 2024. Before we begin today's meeting, please  
12 place all cell phones and other communication devices in  
13 silent mode and please as a courtesy to others do not  
14 carry on side conversations or activities in the meeting  
15 room.

16 I want to welcome those who are with us for  
17 today's committee meeting. If you wish to address the  
18 committee or speak on an agenda item during today's  
19 meeting, please complete a speaker sheet at the  
20 registration table. Please identify the specific item  
21 you are interested in commenting on, your name and  
22 address, and whether you are representing someone or  
23 speaking for yourself.

24 If your comment does not pertain to a  
25 specific agenda item, we will take your comment during a

1 public comment portion of the meeting. In accordance  
2 with the department's administration rule, comments to  
3 the committee will be initiated -- will be limited to  
4 three minutes.

5 To assist each speaker, a timer has been  
6 placed at the podium. The light will be green for the  
7 first two minutes, yellow when the speaker has one  
8 minute left, and red when a speaker's time is up.

9 Individuals cannot accumulate time from other speakers.

10 Comments should be pertinent to the issue  
11 stated on the comment sheet. When addressing the  
12 committee, please state your name and affiliation for  
13 the record. There are a few things that will assist in  
14 making the meeting room run smoother and assist the  
15 court reporter in getting an accurate record. Please  
16 identify yourself before speaking. Speak clearly and  
17 slowly. Do not speak over others. And please ask the  
18 chairperson for permission to speak, and be sure to get  
19 recognized before speaking.

20 I would like to thank our court reporter  
21 who is transcribing this meeting. Before we begin  
22 today, I would like to remind all presenters and those  
23 in attendance of the rules in conduct of our committee  
24 meeting. In the department administrative rule, I have  
25 authority to supervise the conduct of meetings. This

1 includes the authority to determine whether a speaker is  
2 being disruptive of the meeting or is otherwise  
3 violating the timing or presentation ideas I have  
4 discussed.

5 The posted agenda stated that a quorum of  
6 the MVCPA board may present at this meeting. However,  
7 board members who are not members of the Grants, Budget,  
8 and Committee [sic] will not vote on any committee  
9 agenda item today, nor will have any board action to be  
10 taken. I see that member Rebecca Cantu Serano is  
11 present. As you can see, our -- our chairperson, Chief  
12 Mike Rodriguez, is sitting up with us. He has no vote,  
13 no say so. He's just here.

14 MR. RODRIGUEZ: They're going to turn off  
15 my mic just so everybody knows.

16 MS. JONES: We now move on to Agenda Item  
17 No. 1 which is roll call and establishment of quorum.

18 Member Brotherton (phonetic) is not  
19 present.

20 Member Cantu Serano?

21 MS. CANTU SERANO: Present.

22 MS. JONES: Let the record reflect that I,  
23 Sharon Jones, am here too. We have a quorum.

24 We now move on to Agenda Item No. 2 which  
25 is the Pledges of Allegiance. Please stand and honor

1 our state and country.

2 (The United States Pledge of Allegiance and  
3 The Texas Pledge of Allegiance.)

4 MS. JONES: Please be seated.

5 I now move on to Agenda Item No. 3,  
6 comments and announcements from the board chair,  
7 committee members, and the MVCPA director.

8 For those of you who are unaware -- we're  
9 all in Harris County by the way. Houston, Texas, Harris  
10 County for those of you that are out of state and some  
11 are out of the country who are visiting. So one of  
12 Harris County deputies, he lost his life in the line of  
13 duty this week. And then we have a member, a civilian  
14 member, of the Houston Police Department who also lost  
15 his life during the flood. So as we go about our week,  
16 let's keep them in our thoughts, our prayers, our  
17 families. May God watch over their families as they  
18 move on.

19 Also, there are many members of the Harris  
20 County task force and the Houston task force that were  
21 affected by the flood. And so we need to keep them in  
22 our prayers and our thoughts as well as just in general  
23 Houston and the surrounding areas. There's a lot that's  
24 been happening here since the storm.

25 So -- which brings me to why we're hot

1 today. So I swear the AC was working until yesterday.  
2 There was a power outage. The generators kicked in,  
3 brought up the air -- brought up the electricity. But  
4 the Internet and the AC did not come back up. I think  
5 the Internet is working now, correct? Yes. I got some  
6 nods. The Internet is working. The hotel asked me to  
7 let you know that they are -- they are in the -- in the  
8 process of contracting, negotiating with a company to  
9 bring in some -- some portable chillers. So that's  
10 ongoing.

11 We are going to have frequent breaks.  
12 We're going to have more breaks than usual. Those of  
13 you that are standing, I know why you're standing in the  
14 back. That's where the air is. So as long as you can  
15 hear, that -- that's fine. Also again, if you need to  
16 wear different clothing to make sure that you stay cool,  
17 please do so. We don't want people passing out,  
18 strokes. We don't want any of that. We have to  
19 remember how to do CPR and call 911.

20 Just hydrate. We have a lot of water in  
21 the back. I see water everywhere. So please stay  
22 hydrated. And if you need to get up and move out of the  
23 room, that's not a problem as well.

24 Member Cantu, do you have any  
25 announcements, ma'am?



1 MS. CANTU SERANO: No, ma'am.

2 MS. JONES: Okay. I almost called you  
3 Major Diggs.

4 Mr. Diggs.

5 MR. DIGGS: And I answer to just about  
6 anything, Madam Chair. So the only thing I would add is  
7 the general manager has advised me that he will have an  
8 update on the chiller, the main chiller, at 1:00 o'clock  
9 today. So hopefully we'll have additional information  
10 here at 1:00 p.m. today. Thank you, ma'am.

11 MS. JONES: Thank you, sir.

12 We now move on to Agenda Item No. 4 which  
13 is MVCPA fiscal year 2024 and fiscal year 2025 budget  
14 overview by MVCPA director William Diggs.

15 MR. DIGGS: Thank you. William Diggs,  
16 MVCPA director for the record, Madam Chair. So if you  
17 will look on pages 5, 6, and 7, you're going to see some  
18 charts, and that's going to tell a little bit about  
19 where we stand with our FY-24 budgets.

20 Currently for FY-24 as of the end of June  
21 in our Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention budget, which I'll  
22 refer that as our Task Force Budget, our main budget, we  
23 have \$1,655,769 remaining as of the end of June. And in  
24 our SB-224 catalytic converter funding budget, at the  
25 end of June there is \$20,201,294. I know that sounds

1 like a whole lot of money, and it is. And the reason  
2 for some of those dollars to remain is the way that the  
3 SGAs have been issued out for the first round of FY-24  
4 SB-224 catalytic converter funding and the pending  
5 second-round funding that we're going to be considering  
6 this week which totals a little over \$10 million. And  
7 so that's why you hear a lot of dollars left in the  
8 catalytic converter funding at the end of June.

9           And then if you will look on page 9 and 10  
10 of your committee book, you will see some charts that  
11 reflect the FY-25 estimated budgets. And for FY-25, we  
12 have a total of -- in catalytic converter funding, we  
13 have an estimated \$30,378,803 for FY-25. And then for  
14 FY-24 -- I'm sorry -- FY-25, motor vehicle crime  
15 prevention budget, again our main budget, our task force  
16 budget, we have an estimated \$24,899,500 overall.

17           And those are the -- the budget reports  
18 that I have for you today. And I'm happy to take any  
19 questions.

20           MS. JONES: Member Cantu, do you have any  
21 questions for Director Diggs?

22           MS. CANTU SERANO: No, ma'am.

23           MS. JONES: No discussions or questions.

24           We now move on to Agenda Item No. 5, Grant  
25 Management Tracking System.

1 Director Diggs.

2 MR. DIGGS: Thank you. William, Diggs,  
3 director MVCPA for the record. I'm happy to announce  
4 that -- myself, staff, the information technology  
5 division of the Texas DMV -- we continue to work closely  
6 with a number of the task forces around the state. And  
7 we are currently reviewing a number of solutions for a  
8 new grant management tracking system.

9 And on page 11 of your committee book,  
10 you'll see some information as it relates to some  
11 additional questions that we have narrowed the field to  
12 as far as there are a number of companies that are out  
13 there that are currently on the DRI contract. So in  
14 theory once we make a selection in working through ITSD  
15 and then the -- the finance office at Texas DMV, we will  
16 be able to move forward with that new solution.

17 We anticipate that new solution will be in  
18 place by the end of the calendar year '25. We don't  
19 want to rush this solution. There's a number of  
20 follow-up questions that we had for some of these  
21 companies. We're waiting for some responses to come  
22 back. Again, we want to make sure that we get this  
23 right. This is kind of, you know, one bite at the  
24 apple, and we want to make sure that we take this the  
25 right way.

1                   And so that's why we're still kind of  
2 working on it. We've been working on it for a few  
3 months. We'll make some decisions hopefully here soon.  
4 And I hope to have an additional update on a selected  
5 company during our October board meeting.

6                   MS. JONES: Member --

7                   MS. CANTU SERANO: No, ma'am.

8                   MS. JONES: No questions. We now move on  
9 to Agenda Item No. 6, Fiscal Year '24, Senate Bill 224,  
10 catalytic converter grant second solicitation  
11 presentation by Director Diggs.

12                   MR. DIGGS: Thank you, Madam Chair.  
13 William Diggs, director of MVCPA for the record. So on  
14 page 12, this is where this starts. And I had mentioned  
15 to some of the task force commanders this morning how  
16 this would lay out this morning. We have three  
17 different grants that we're looking at for an award this  
18 week. The first one is the FY-24 second round. We have  
19 a total of 21 grantees who are asking for funding.

20                   What I'm going to do today is I'm going to  
21 call you up one at a time. You're going to come up to  
22 the center table here. You'll have three to  
23 five minutes. Remember what we talked about: You can  
24 give a verbal -- a quick verbal overview, hit the  
25 highlights of what you're hoping to accomplish.

1 I'm going to read your name and ask that  
2 you come up. If you would please, be sure and turn your  
3 mic on. Make sure you identify who you are and -- and  
4 your position in that -- in that agency before you start  
5 speaking. And we'll go from there. It's going to be  
6 a -- it's going to be a pretty lengthy process. We've  
7 got a total of 21 second-round grants grantees to hear  
8 from. And then in FY-25 for SB-224, we've got a total  
9 of 22. And then for FY-25 task force grants today,  
10 we've got a total of 29.

11 So as you can tell, there's a number of  
12 folks that we want to hear from. And after each series,  
13 we'll go back, and then I'll make a recommendation to  
14 the -- to the GBR -- to the GBR committee. And then  
15 they will make a decision today as far as how they move  
16 forward on Friday when it is presented to the full  
17 board. So that's kind of the process of how it's going  
18 to lay out.

19 And, Madam Chair, I would like to begin.

20 MS. JONES: Member Cantu Serano, do you  
21 have any questions for Mr. Diggs?

22 MS. CANTU SERANO: No, ma'am.

23 MR. DIGGS: All right. If you are in need  
24 of a PowerPoint to be put up on the screen, if you  
25 haven't already done so, please let us know when you

1 walk up. We'll have staff quickly get your PowerPoint  
2 up as well as provide you with a clicker so that you can  
3 move forward or backwards during your presentation.

4 MS. JONES: Mr. Diggs, we have no questions  
5 or discussions for you. Let's move on to Agenda Item  
6 No. 7, Senate Bill -- I feel we're still on 6.

7 MR. DIGGS: Thank you, Madam Chair. So I  
8 would like to call up the City of Andrews for the SB-224  
9 FY-24. If you are here, please come forward. The  
10 amount is \$16,850.

11 All right. City of Andrews -- do not see  
12 them. Moving forward.

13 The next applicant is the City of Beaumont  
14 for FY-24 SB-224 catalytic converter second  
15 solicitation. If you would, please come forward. The  
16 amount is \$527,700.

17 Good morning.

18 SERGEANT KARR: Good morning. I'm Sergeant  
19 Ken Karr with Beaumont Police Department, Southeast  
20 Texas Auto Theft Task Force. Good morning, everybody.

21 MS. JONES: Good morning, sir.

22 SERGEANT KARR: Thank you for the  
23 opportunity to come up and speak with you. We applied  
24 for the SB-224 second round and -- to address the issue  
25 of the catalytic converter theft in southeast Texas.

1 2021 through 2023 we have the all-time highs of metal  
2 prices, and the task force experienced a dramatic  
3 increase along with everybody in the country -- the  
4 state, the country, and the world for that matter. We  
5 had over 650 catalytic converter thefts reported during  
6 that time frame. The numbers are actually going to be  
7 higher, but those are the only numbers that I could  
8 verify from all the agencies in the area.

9           They don't have -- can everybody hear me?  
10 Okay. They don't have -- I'm trying to work with them.  
11 We track ours through theft and motor vehicle parts.  
12 They have them under different things -- precious  
13 metals. They have them all under different things due  
14 to their reporting system.

15           The -- I have to skip -- y'all, through me,  
16 I had -- I had made a presentation to cover all three  
17 grants at once. So I'm having to bust this up a little  
18 bit it.

19           MS. JONES: That's okay. I had that in my  
20 mind too.

21           SERGEANT KARR: I think it would've been a  
22 little quicker, but I'm not bitching.

23           The Beaumont Police Department, Southeast  
24 Auto Theft Task Force is requesting \$527,000. The  
25 equipment that we are requesting is two vehicles, two

1 trucks. One is for the Jefferson County Sheriff's  
2 Office who is currently without a vehicle. He's driving  
3 an ancient Tahoe that used to be an interdiction car.  
4 We're also requesting night vision binoculars to assist  
5 us with their thermal, to assist us with operations at  
6 night covering these parking lots where most of these  
7 catalytic converters occur.

8 Oh, I'm sorry. We're also asking for a  
9 four-post lift. We have one currently that is -- it's  
10 pretty old. We'll probably try to replace it at some  
11 point. We wanted a supplement in order to assist with  
12 the catalytic converter marking events that we plan on  
13 holding. We're asking for the actual cordless pen  
14 marking system. We're also asking for a drone to assist  
15 with surveillance. It's a thermal and zoom drone to  
16 assist with apartment complexes, hotel parking lots,  
17 anywhere there's a large quantity of vehicles that we  
18 can surveil at night and during the day as well.

19 The main thing that we're looking for is  
20 our Flock cameras. Not unlike every department in the  
21 nation virtually, we can't hire enough people. So we're  
22 trying to concentrate on force multipliers -- Flock  
23 cameras. The City of Beaumont recently purchased Axon  
24 cameras for their patrol cars and using those as well.  
25 Those also operate as LPRs.



1                   We're hoping that this would be the  
2 integral part of our intelligence gathering for  
3 catalytic converter theft as well as auto theft. We  
4 have already had great success with Flock cameras with  
5 the auto theft portion. Our catalytic converter theft  
6 right now is fairly small, very small actually. In the  
7 past we could've used a lot of these. Would've been  
8 great to have them.

9                   Houston helped us a lot during that  
10 catalytic converter rampage, frenzy, whatever it was by  
11 using the Flock cameras. They have a lot more of them  
12 than we do. We were able to identify numerous suspects  
13 in Houston and work with Houston and got those guys  
14 arrested and/or identified and arrested.

15                   That's pretty much the highlights.  
16 Beaumont has cranked up a real-time crime center which  
17 all of this will be linked to so that we can -- any  
18 ongoing operations that we have, we can actually use  
19 Fusus where -- we're using Fusus to access public and  
20 private cameras. That will be additional force  
21 multipliers in addition to the Flock cameras.

22                   And I'm out of time.

23                   MS. JONES: Sir, you mentioned cordless  
24 peen --

25                   SERGEANT KARR: The cordless -- it's a

1 FlyMarker cordless pen. It stamps the VIN on the  
2 catalytic converter.

3 MS. JONES: Okay. For the record, when you  
4 guys come up here, if you're going to discuss something  
5 that is a countermeasure for investigation, you don't  
6 have to, like, give the specifics of what it is that you  
7 are requesting. So I just wanted to get the -- the  
8 gist -- I just heard something cordless. But just be  
9 sure definitely do not divulge any -- anything that will  
10 counter what we're doing.

11 Okay. Thank you, sir.

12 SERGEANT KARR: Thank you.

13 MS. JONES: Member Cantu, do you have any  
14 questions?

15 MS. CANTU SERANO: Yes. How many Flock  
16 cameras were you planning to purchase?

17 SERGEANT KARR: It's a lease. 88.

18 MS. CANTU SERANO: Okay.

19 SERGEANT KARR: Which would pretty much  
20 seal up the City of Beaumont.

21 MS. CANTU SERANO: Okay.

22 SERGEANT KARR: And some of the outlying  
23 areas.

24 MS. CANTU SERANO: Okay. Perfect. Thank  
25 you.

1 SERGEANT KARR: Thank you.

2 MS. JONES: Mr. Diggs?

3 MR. DIGGS: Madam Chair, I don't have any  
4 questions. Thank you for the presentation.

5 So next up would be the City of Carrollton  
6 for FY-24 SB-224 catalytic converter second  
7 solicitation. The amount is \$221,000.

8 MS. SAYER: Thank you for having me. My  
9 name is Jessica Sayer (phonetic). I'm the compliance  
10 manager for the Carrollton Police Department. We  
11 actually put in for the FY-24 and for the '25 grant.  
12 This will be our first year applying for those. And we  
13 are also asking for Flock cameras for the majority of  
14 our grant. The first year is going to cover  
15 implementation of 57 Flock cameras for our city. That  
16 would be in addition to our 19. Originally Flock  
17 suggested that the size of our city with the population  
18 of 133,000, covers about 37 square miles would be  
19 roughly just a little over 100 Flock cameras would be  
20 necessary for full coverage. So we'll be pretty close  
21 to halfway there if we were able to implement those.

22 As far as our -- let me grab my notes here.  
23 So for our FY-24 grant, we are requesting \$753,000.  
24 That would cover the one lease for 57 cameras, and also  
25 we would be covering the implementation fee ourselves for

1 \$46,300.

2 And then our FY-25, we're just requesting  
3 to renew that lease. And so while the City of  
4 Carrollton -- just a few stats for us. You know, along  
5 with other agencies, we have seen a huge reduction in  
6 catalytic converter thefts. But at the same time, we're  
7 seeing an increase in just general vehicle crime  
8 overall. We've received -- we've see 60 -- 15 percent  
9 increase in vehicle theft and crimes all together while  
10 we've seen a reduction of 60 percent of catalytic  
11 converter thefts overall.

12 And so these Flock cameras will help us  
13 with, you know, staffing issues that people also have.  
14 And then we're also wanting to implement a real-time  
15 crime center. So we'll be able to monitor those, and  
16 also it will help with the apprehension of these  
17 situations.

18 And our agency is also right in the middle  
19 of several interstates. So we have I-35. We have 635.  
20 We have President George Bush highway that goes through  
21 our city as well. So we're a very major pass-through  
22 city as you can see. So these cameras will help with  
23 that so.

24 MS. JONES: Member Cantu, any questions?

25 MS. CANTU SERANO: No, ma'am.

1 MS. JONES: Mr. Diggs.

2 MR. DIGGS: (Nonverbal response.)

3 MS. JONES: Let's proceed. No questions  
4 from us.

5 MS. SAYER: Thank you.

6 MS. JONES: You're welcome, ma'am.

7 MR. DIGGS: I would like to call up the  
8 City of Converse for the FY-24 SB-224 catalytic  
9 converter second solicitation. The amount is \$43,150.

10 CHIEF LANE: Good morning. My name is  
11 Bobby Lane. I'm the chief of police actually for  
12 Converse. I've been there about three and a half years.  
13 Just a little bit about our department. We're  
14 56 officers in the department. We only cover 10 square  
15 miles. So we're here, of course, trying to bring in new  
16 technology, bring different things into the community to  
17 fight crime.

18 One thing we're here to do is, of course,  
19 ask for the grant to help fight the crime on catalytic  
20 converters. The last couple of years we had 41  
21 catalytic converters stolen. But if you can imagine  
22 41 catalytic converters for a 10-square-mile area, it's  
23 quite a few. We are seeing a lot of the property crimes  
24 come up.

25 Of course our theft to vehicles is actually

1 through the roof. Last year they were 110. This year  
2 we're actually tracking for the same amount of vehicle  
3 thefts or more. And these -- these -- this grant would  
4 actually help us place 11 Flock cameras throughout our  
5 city. And we've already identified strategic locations  
6 that we're able to get -- that will help us identify the  
7 people that are coming into our city.

8           Now one thing about San Antonio is that we  
9 are -- we are in the metroplex. So there's 46 different  
10 agencies in that metroplex. And the information that's  
11 coming from the Flock cameras will be shared with all  
12 the other agencies including the Southwest Texas Fusion  
13 Center. So it's not going to be just used for us. It's  
14 going to be shared with everybody. The Alamo area  
15 chiefs, we're all getting together and identifying areas  
16 we can place these cameras up to, of course -- you know,  
17 the criminals don't follow geographical areas. They go  
18 anywhere they want. So these cameras would actually  
19 help us, you know, find these individuals and apprehend  
20 them.

21           But I stand for any questions that you may  
22 have.

23           MS. JONES: Sir, does the Southwest  
24 Center -- Texas Fusion Center, I know San Antonio -- do  
25 they already have access to the Flock system?

1 CHIEF LANE: So they do. They're actually  
2 working with Flock now. I know San Antonio is just --  
3 they're purchasing several cameras throughout their  
4 area, and several of the small cities are purchasing  
5 them as well so we can have -- we can have a good, you  
6 know, contingent of cameras.

7 MS. JONES: Yes, sir.

8 Member Serano Cantu -- Cantu Serano.

9 MS. CANTU SERANO: No.

10 MS. JONES: Sir, no questions.

11 CHIEF LANE: Thank you so much.

12 MS. JONES: You're welcome. Thank you.

13 MR. DIGGS: Thank you, Chief. So I  
14 actually skipped over -- my apologies -- the City of  
15 Conroe for FY-24 SB-224 catalytic converter second  
16 solicitation. The amount is \$72,000. So the City of  
17 Conroe.

18 Moving on to the City of Corpus Christi for  
19 FY-24 SB-224 catalytic converter second solicitation.  
20 The amount is \$72,408.

21 MR. KNUTSON: Can y'all hear me?

22 MS. JONES: Yes, sir.

23 MR. KNUTSON: The City of Corpus -- my name  
24 is Kyle Knutson. I am the program manager for the  
25 Corpus Christi Auto Theft Task Force. I've been in this

1 position for about three months. So I'm a little bit  
2 new.

3 Can you hear?

4 MS. JONES: Can you repeat your name for  
5 the record and agency.

6 MR. KNUTSON: My name is Kyle Knutson. I  
7 am the program manager for the Auto Theft Task Force for  
8 Corpus Christi. The City of Corpus Christi seeks the  
9 SB-224 grant to enhance its auto theft task force to  
10 address pressing issues of catalytic converter theft.  
11 The grant will provide essential -- the grant will  
12 provide essential funding to implement advanced  
13 technology solutions, engage in community awareness  
14 campaigns, and enhance the law enforcement capabilities.

15 The ATTF aims to significantly reduce the  
16 theft incidents, improve public safety, and foster  
17 secure community environment. The initiative aligns  
18 with our strategic priorities to ensure safer and more  
19 resilient cities -- resilient city.

20 The problem statement -- the catalytic  
21 converter theft hasn't -- has increased over the past  
22 few years, driven by the high volume of the precious  
23 metals. In 2021, there were 603 cases of catalytic  
24 converter theft that were reported, making up 61 percent  
25 of all theft parts. However, in 2022, the number



1 decreased to 594 with implementation of the new  
2 legislative bill -- legislation bill including harsher  
3 penalties introduced by the Senate bill. The total  
4 number of thefts drastically decreased to 164 in 2023.

5           The significant reduction highlights the  
6 effectiveness of the Senate bill combating catalytic  
7 converter theft. While precious metals have gone down  
8 in price in '23 and '24, we are confident that they will  
9 rise again in the future. The Auto Theft Task Force  
10 believes that criminals will eventually find their ways  
11 to circumvent these penalties, leading to potentially  
12 increase of catalytic converter thefts and the precious  
13 metal thefts in the future.

14           Goals -- prevent catalytic converter theft,  
15 implement proactive measures to prevent theft through  
16 advanced technology and public awareness. Enhance law  
17 enforcement capabilities, equip law enforcement with the  
18 necessary tools and resources to effectively tackle and  
19 investigate theft incidents.

20           Community engagement -- raise public  
21 awareness and educate the community on preventative  
22 measures.

23           Some activities -- public awareness and  
24 education -- educational outreach events, conduct  
25 monthly presentations, and educate the public on

1 preventing catalytic converter thefts.

2 Etching initiatives -- implement programs  
3 to etch serial numbers on converters to deter thefts.  
4 These initiatives are critical components of the  
5 program. Etching unique identification numbers on  
6 catalytic converters, we make it difficult for thieves  
7 to steal -- to sell stolen parts as these marked  
8 converters can be traced back to their original  
9 vehicles. This method not only deters theft but also  
10 aids in the recovery of stolen converters.

11 Social media campaigns -- regularly  
12 updated -- update the community through social media on  
13 preventive measures and task force activities.

14 TCOLE trainings -- provide classes,  
15 training to law enforcement officers on recognizing,  
16 handling catalytic converter cases.

17 Collaborative efforts -- the ATTF will  
18 collaborate with neighboring jurisdictions sharing  
19 information and coordinating efforts to tackle the  
20 incident effectively. Joint operations and regular  
21 meetings will ensure the optimal use of the resource.

22 Justification of the equipment that we are  
23 asking for -- hydraulic vehicle lifts, these are crucial  
24 for safely accessing catalytic converters on various  
25 vehicles. By elevating the vehicles, law enforcement

1 can easily paint, mark, etch, and engrave VIN numbers on  
2 catalytic converters deterring and aiding  
3 investigations. Laser engravers -- used to mark serial  
4 VIN numbers on catalytic converters. The laser engraver  
5 providing clear and permanent identification method,  
6 making it difficult for thieves to sell stolen  
7 converters.

8 Thermal surveillance and search drones --  
9 these drones are indispensable for surveillance  
10 operations equipped with live streaming capabilities.  
11 They will allow our law enforcement to monitor large  
12 areas, track suspects, and gather real-time intelligence  
13 especially in high-risk locations such as dealerships  
14 and salvage yards.

15 Funds allocated for proactive operations,  
16 reactive assessments, public awareness activities  
17 conducted outside of normal business hours. The budget  
18 covers overtime for the detective to involve  
19 investigations and community outreach events.

20 So in conclusion, the SB-224 grant for  
21 fiscal year '24 will significantly enhance the  
22 capabilities of Corpus Christi Auto Theft Task Force,  
23 reducing catalytic converter theft, and increasing  
24 public safety. The proposed equipment and activities  
25 are critical in achieving the outlined goals and

1 ensuring a safer community.

2 Is there any questions?

3 MS. JONES: Member Cantu, any questions?

4 MS. CANTU SERANO: No.

5 MS. JONES: No questions, sir.

6 MR. DIGGS: Thank you. So I think we're  
7 going to switch the mics out real quick.

8 While they're doing that, I would like to  
9 call up the City of El Paso for the second round FY-24  
10 SB-224 grant. The amount is \$1,391,615.

11 OFFICER COSTA: Good morning. My name is  
12 Officer Jessica Costa. I'm a member of the El Paso Task  
13 Force.

14 MS. JONES: One moment, ma'am. When you  
15 guys come up, it's really loud with the fans. And  
16 it's -- yeah, the fan is interfering. So speak up  
17 louder than usual, please. We apologize for the  
18 inconvenience. We know you can yell. We know that.  
19 Just pretend there's a crook in front of you. "Stop."

20 LIEUTENANT PORRAS: For the record,  
21 Lieutenant Ricardo Porras, task force commander of the  
22 El Paso Police Department Auto Theft Task Force.

23 MS. JONES: Still no? Do we need to take a  
24 five-minute break to get this together? Okay. Let's  
25 continue, please.

1           OFFICER COSTA: All right. I'm going to  
2 jump right into our largest line item which is our  
3 equipment request. We are requesting two 2024 Ford  
4 F-250s with vehicle wraps for crime prevention  
5 awareness, 35 quick-deploy LPR cameras, two  
6 vehicle-mounted LPRs, four LPR trailers also with wraps  
7 for crime prevention awareness, two catalytic converters  
8 VIN etching engravers, and bait vehicles of a Toyota  
9 Corolla, a Honda CRV, and Toyota Tundra.

10           Our equipment usage -- we do aim to  
11 increase crime prevention and awareness pertaining to  
12 catalytic converter thefts through the use of vehicle  
13 displays and community outreach events. We would also  
14 like to purchase and utilize more LPR cameras, both  
15 fixed and mobile, to aid in investigation and  
16 apprehension of offenders.

17           LPR cameras would primarily be placed at  
18 the porch entry and along the border with New Mexico.  
19 The task force will conduct bait operations utilizing  
20 the Toyota Corolla, Honda CRV, and the Toyota Tundra.  
21 These vehicles are the most targeted vehicles for  
22 catalytic converter thefts in our region. We are  
23 currently using an acid method of catalytic converters  
24 etching which is much less effective. We would like to  
25 purchase the catalytic engravers. And with those, we

1 aim to partner with businesses, 68-A inspections, and  
2 various community outreach events.

3 Now, as far as the budget, we do request  
4 for overtime operations of \$400,000. And with such  
5 request, we do also ask for an exemption to the MVCPA  
6 grant manual, Section 4.3, pertaining to approved  
7 overtime. The reason for this exemption is to allow any  
8 El Paso Police Department sworn peace officer not  
9 assigned to the task force permission to work SB-224 OT  
10 operations targeting catalytic converter thefts. Our  
11 reason for this request is so that we could utilize  
12 marked units and uniformed officers to aid in takedowns  
13 and conducting traffic stops.

14 Do you guys have any questions?

15 MS. CANTU SERANO: No.

16 MS. JONES: No, ma'am.

17 MR. DIGGS: So next, I'd like to call up  
18 the City of Farmers Branch for SB-224 FY-24 second  
19 solicitation. The amount is \$50,000.

20 MS. TAVERA: Hello, Committee. Perla  
21 Tavera, deputy director of finance.

22 MS. ANDERS: Good morning. Ashton Anders,  
23 media and compliance specialist for the police  
24 department.

25 MS. TAVERA: Thank you, Committee. Today

1 the City of Farmers Branch is asking for \$50,000. This  
2 is in regards so we can purchase the Flock Operating  
3 System. And then the remaining amount of 14,000 would  
4 be able to purchase four to five additional cameras. We  
5 have seen, since we are right in the border of Dallas  
6 and the City of Irving, an increase in burglar motor  
7 vehicles. Currently it stands at about 144 to --  
8 147 reports here to date with a total about 283 from  
9 prior calendar.

10 We're currently working on the restructure  
11 of criminal investigations division to create a property  
12 crimes unit within the division to address the uptake in  
13 crimes like these. We have about 14 cameras which  
14 represent 10 percent of the total needed. So this grant  
15 will assist us with not only purchasing the Flock system  
16 but the additional cameras as mentioned. The operating  
17 system ties into real-time crime center to help set up  
18 intelligence center to combat these crimes.

19 Thank you for the opportunity, and we are  
20 excited to -- the ongoing partnership. Any questions?

21 MS. CANTU SERANO: No, ma'am.

22 MS. JONES: That was very fast.

23 MS. TAVERA: I like to be fast, efficient,  
24 effective, and it is really hot.

25 MS. JONES: I like that answer. Love,

1 love, love it.

2 MR. DIGGS: Thank you, ma'am.

3 MS. TAVERA: Thank you.

4 MS. JONES: No questions.

5 MR. DIGGS: So I'd like to call up next --  
6 so I would like to --

7 MS. JONES: Oh, yes sir. And after this  
8 one, we need to take a break.

9 MR. DIGGS: Yes, ma'am. So I would like to  
10 call up next the City of Frisco. The amount is \$256,000  
11 for FY-24 SB-224 second solicitation.

12 LIEUTENANT MATTEI: Good morning, members  
13 of the board. My name is Lieutenant Evan Mattei. I  
14 have with me our crime analyst, Mr. Daniel --

15 MR. KIM: Morning. Daniel Kim, crime  
16 analyst administrator for the Frisco Police Department.

17 MS. JONES: Good morning.

18 LIEUTENANT MATTEI: As you stated, our  
19 SB-224 FY-24 second solicitation is for \$256,000. This  
20 is for direct operating expenses of an automated license  
21 plate recognition system, or LPR, cameras and software.  
22 That would be for a 60-camera lease. Since 2001, the  
23 City of Frisco has experienced over 700 catalytic  
24 converter thefts at an estimated loss of over  
25 \$2 million.



1           Our intent is to place these cameras in  
2 areas of focus identified by our data-driven approach to  
3 crime and traffic safety hotspots and other areas of  
4 high crime in addition to other areas around the city.

5           We also aim to continue to support the --  
6 and work with the North Texas Auto Theft Task force  
7 through intel sharing. And other agencies in our areas  
8 also have this similar technology. And we are kind of a  
9 central hub which a number of these agencies who also  
10 experience similar thefts suspects will travel through.

11           And so we want to be able to provide the  
12 same intelligence and share that with them. We also  
13 seek to enhance the capabilities of our two detectives  
14 that are assigned to our auto theft and -- or auto crime  
15 specifically. And we hope to expand our requests here  
16 in the coming years.

17           And lastly, we also aim to work with our  
18 community to show that these crimes are important to us  
19 and we have enhanced capabilities through this  
20 technology to investigate these crimes so that we can  
21 basically resolve them without having to -- without  
22 having to just clear the case.

23           So, Mr. Kim, did I miss anything?

24           MR. KIM: Yes. And currently with the  
25 region, there's a little bit of a hole in our area when

1 it comes to technology and license plate readers --  
2 recognizers. We want to modernize the police  
3 department, bring it up to speed in the surrounding  
4 areas so that we can work in conjunction with them as  
5 well. We also are working on an unofficial campaign  
6 kind of trust and transparency, working with the public  
7 and public engagement as well as providing information  
8 regarding this system if we were to be awarded to engage  
9 them, bring them up to speed, provide them information,  
10 and give them the opportunity to understand and  
11 experience what a system like this would benefit for the  
12 community.

13 LIEUTENANT MATTEI: With that, we will  
14 answer your questions.

15 MS. JONES: Member Cantu.

16 MS. CANTU SERANO: No, ma'am.

17 MS. JONES: No questions. Thank you.

18 LIEUTENANT MATTEI: Thank you.

19 MS. JONES: It is -- let's say  
20 11:00 o'clock. Let's take a 15-minute break.
