As of Monday, it was in the final phases in human resources; but I am happy to report this morning that Deputy Director Earl Pence has made a final offer and the new employee will start on August the 1st; and we will be full again.

I am happy to take any questions.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Members, any questions for Director Diggs?

There are no questions, all right.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Mr. Chairman and members, moving on to Page 6 of your board book, you will find Agenda Item 4B.

This is related to updating our GMTS system. I am glad to report that we have been working closely with our ITSD counterparts along with our finance office.

We have worked with task forces in different locations in Texas as well as the MVCPA staff. They have done a phenomenal job.

We have narrowed the field to five



1 different companies throughout the U.S. We are 2 currently awaiting on some additional questions that we asked. You will see them listed at the bottom of 3 4 Page 6. As soon as we get the responses back, we plan to meet again; and we are going to narrow the 6 7 field to two or three companies. We don't want to make a rush decision. We want to get this right. 8 hope is that we have the new GMTS system in place by 10 the end of the next calendar year. 11 And that concludes my report. 12 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: How many systems are we 13 looking at for the GMTS? 14 DIRECTOR DIGGS: Sir? 15 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: How many systems are we 16 looking at? 17 DIRECTOR DIGGS: So right now we started 18 off with we have 24 responses. We narrowed that to 19 five, and so we are looking at five different 20 companies. 21 We are waiting for some additional



information to come back from them, and then we will

probably narrow it to two or three, and then we will

questions or possibly have those companies come back

go from there and see if there is any additional

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and provide an additional presentation so that we can ask additional questions.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Are there any questions for Director Diggs?

Thank you, director.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Mr. Chairman and members, on Page 7 of your board book you will find some information on Agenda Item 4C is where it starts.

This is just a brief overview of our FY 2024 budget and then also our FY25 projected budget. This is through the end of June, and currently we have remaining in our FY24 budget \$1.3 million, and then we have got -- and that's going to be for our motor vehicle task force budget, and then the remaining four are SB224 budget.

We currently have remaining \$20 million, and I know that sounds like a large number, and it is. Some of that is because we are finalizing the first round of awards for SB224 in the system. They just haven't quite hit our financial records yet in the DMV, and then also we are waiting to make the final award of the second round SB224, and we are doing that this morning.

And then moving on to our FY25 projected budget. On Page 12, you can see where we have



estimated funds to be 24 point -- just under \$24.9 million for our task force budget and for, you know, supporting the task forces throughout Texas.

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And then if you move to the next page and that's going to be on our SB224 FY25 budget, there is just a little over \$30 million that we believe will be the estimated dollar amount; and again, I say estimated because we believe we have some funds that are going to UB forward from FY24; and we are also waiting on some additional funds that will settle from some additional insurance collections over the summer with the CPA's office.

And that concludes my budget update.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So what is estimated to be left from the -- after we collect the grant funds to the task forces?

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Okay, great question.

In our FY25 task force budget, it is dependent upon how some of the insurance settlements are finalized here at the end of the summer; and we get the final report back from the CPA at the end of next month.

We have also got some funds that I believe will UB forwarded. My estimate; and again, Chief Rodriguez, this is clearly an estimate. Ι



1 believe those estimated funds that would be remaining 2 after we provide for the additional Tier Two awards 3 that we will talk about here shortly, I believe those 4 dollars will be just a little over a million dollars; and again, chief, that is if everything falls into 5 place as we believe it will today. 6 7 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: As long as there is something left there. 8 9 DIRECTOR DIGGS: And that again is why I 10 feel like we need to be physically responsible and look at a tier system when it comes to our task force 11 12 budget issue. 13 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you. 14 Are there any questions? 15 Thank you, director. 16 DIRECTOR DIGGS: Yes, sir. 17 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Moving on to Agenda 18 Item No. 5. 19 We will now here from Director William 20 Diggs on Agenda Item No. 5A SB224 partner agency 21 inter-agency contract update. 22 DIRECTOR DIGGS: William Diggs, MVCPA Director for the record. 23 24 Mr. Chairman and members, on Page 14 of

Agenda Item 5A. It's our SB224 partner agency inter-agency contract update.

I am happy to announce this morning that a few weeks back, we were able to finalize our Texas DPS MVCPA Texas DMV inter-agency contract. That was fully executed; and here in just the last couple of weeks, we were able to finalize that the same type of contract with our partner TDLR; and that has now fully been executed by both the executive director of TDLR and the executive director of the Texas DMV and also myself as the director of the MVCPA. So both of these inter-agency contracts are fully in play now.

And that concludes my report on 5A.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Members, are there any questions on this agenda item?

Moving on.

Members, we will now hear from Major Sharon Jones on Agenda Item No. 5B, Senate Bill 224 advisory committee updates.

MEMBER JONES: Mr. Chairman, in an effort to preserve my voice, Director Diggs is going to present 5B.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Director Diggs.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Yes. William Diggs,

MVCPA Director for the record.



So I do want to give you guys a quick update. We have had some phenomenal SB224 advisory committee meetings. We have recently had one at the beginning of the month down in San Marcos; but prior to the advisory committee meeting, we actually went and viewed some of the industry.

We did that a couple of months ago here in Houston when we went to Techemet, one of the smelters; and we were able to go to LKQ, an auto parts recycler. They are in New Braunfels; and it was amazing to see their operation; and then later that afternoon, we went to PGM and viewed one of the facilities for metal recycling.

And so again, the industry has opened their doors for us to kind of get a good view of what it is they do and how they do it.

I will tell you that obviously, you know, there is different regulations and regulatory functions that TDLR looks at with the auto parts recyclers. The Texas DPS obviously is looking at the metal recyclers, and so both TDLR, the Texas DMV and the Texas DPS was with us that day along with the advisory committee was there; and so we had a good tour.

I think it was very successful. I feel

like the advisory committee meeting the next morning was very successful. I think that it has been good for law enforcement. Some of our task forces are involved in these committee meetings. I think it's good for industry and also for the law enforcement folks to come together.

MVCPA Major Sharon Jones has been chairing this committee and has done a phenomenal job doing so, and we look forward to -- I am going to refer to it as our final advisory committee meeting. It is in October. It's on October the 3rd in Laredo.

And so, Chief Rodriguez, we look forward to coming over to the border; and hopefully we might be able to get some type of tour of, you know, some of the border there if possible if that all works out.

So that will conclude my update, and I will be happy to take any questions.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Absolutely we will be waiting for the advisory committee in Laredo, not only for a tour of the border but also some great food that you will be getting there also. So watch out for that.

So going back to the advisory committee, is this the last one; or are we continuing with this even after?



No?

Oh, you don't have a voice.

Are we continuing with the --

DIRECTOR DIGGS: And I will go ahead and speak briefly to that.

Whenever we formed these committees back in December here in Houston, we set up some guidelines in our SB224 operations plan; and as it relates to SB224 partner agency meetings, myself and Deputy Executive Director Luna, you know, we are working closely together; and we have been having partner agency meetings every two weeks; and they have been really, really good as far as bringing the agencies all together and putting faces with names and being able to do some pretty cool stuff.

We have decided now to go ahead and continue to meet monthly; and it makes sense; and all of the partner agencies believe so, so that's kind of how we have navigated that.

When it comes to the advisory committee meetings, unless Mr. Richards feels otherwise, I believe if I remember correctly, that would be something that you, yourself, Mr. Chairman, could make a decision on.

Would it -- we have been doing them



quarterly; and so would we continue them quarterly, would it be something less, would it be twice a year; or would this be the end; and so, sir, I am going to yield to you and that will be your decision.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So my question would be, if we put this on the GBR because we already have applications that can be for SB224; and so my question is, who is going to be, I guess, monitoring those strategic plans and those goals that, you know, when we are funding those task forces, how are we doing, what can we do better as we move forward because we will continue receiving the SB224 money, correct?

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Yes, sir, that is we

hope that to be the plan.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So how are we going to

be monitoring every task force's success; and at the end of the day, there is going to be some areas that we are going to have to tweak; and who is going to be responsible to make sure that we have those conversations when it comes to SB224?

MR. RICHARDS: Mr. Chairman, David Richards general counsel for the record.

When we created the advisory committee, they only met four times a year. As Mr. Diggs said, October is the last meeting; but I would recommend



what the board consider is at their October meeting renewing that for another calendar year, at least FY25, to just see how we are doing; and when we put everything in motion, we establish our plan of operation.

I think it's real important to follow-up with that and not just let it drop, so that will be something that you can consider placing on your agenda at the October meeting to re-establish this advisory committee in 2025; and I think the board meetings work really well; and to your point, that way we can keep track of how the task forces are doing and our partner agencies; and we would have a year under our belt to know to at least look back at and see what we can improve on and so forth. So I will recommend re-establishing it at your October meeting.

Thank you.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Sharon, I know that you have no voice.

MEMBER JONES: Yes.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Well, I really think that we should definitely continue with this advisory committee just to see where the gaps are at; and you will be receiving additional funds for this to continue to fund programs.



It is important that we continue to monitor and making sure that wherever those gaps are at, that we start having conversations as to how we can get better.

At the end of the day, we are going to have to report to the legislature as to how we are doing and that this money has been provided to every task force. So the bottom line I think is definitely continue at least for another year.

MEMBER JONES: Yes, sir.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: That would be a motion in October, correct?

MR. RICHARDS: In October we will put it on the agenda.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay, perfect.

Thank you, Director Diggs.

We will now move on to Agenda Item No. 6, grants and budget and reporting committee update.

We will now hear from -- we are supposed to hear from Major Sharon Jones. We are going to hear from Director Diggs regarding Agenda Item No. 6A, fiscal year '24 Senate Bill 224 second round catalytic converter grant award recommendations.

MEMBER JONES: Mr. Chairman, I will make the motion; and then Director Diggs is going to read



1 the awards. 2 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay. So are we just 3 doing the motion? 4 You are doing the motion? MEMBER JONES: Uh-huh. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Director Diggs. 6 DIRECTOR DIGGS: 7 Thank you. Williams Diggs, MVCPA Director for the 8 9 record. 10 So on Monday, the task forces actually 11 came in or the grantees; and in some circumstances, it 12 wasn't a current task force. They came in and made 13 the request for the GBR committee for SB224 second 14 round funding; and so the following -- I am going to 15 go ahead and read it now. 16 The GBR on Monday approved these task 17 forces along with the grantees along with the dollar 18 amount to be presented today to the full board for 19 approval, and we had some fantastic presentations on 20 Monday. The staff of the different agencies did a 21 great job presenting their case. 22 So I did want to say that the City of 23 Andrews, they requested \$16,850.00. 24 The City of Beaumont requested

\$527,700.00.

1 The City of Carrollton, the request is 2 for \$221,000.00. The City of Conroe, the request is for 3 4 \$95,000.00. The City of Converse, the request is for 5 \$43,150.00. 6 7 The City of Corpus Christi, the request is for \$72,408.00. 8 9 The City of El Paso, the request is for 10 \$1,391,615.00. 11 The City of Farmers Branch, the request 12 is for \$50,000.00. 13 The City of Frisco, the request is for 14 \$256,000.00. 15 Johnson County, the request is for 16 \$250,000.00. 17 The City of La Marque, the request is for \$748,665.00. 18 19 Lubbock County was approved for 20 381,450.00 by the GBR committee on Monday. 21 Maverick County, the request was for 22 \$175,666.00. 23 Montgomery County, the request was for 24 \$397,574.00. 25 Polk County, the request was for



1 | \$55,516.00.

The City of Refugio, the request was for \$38,250.00.

The City of Sulphur Springs, the request was for \$30,000.00.

The City of Sunset Valley, the request was for \$65,625.00.

The City of Texas City, the request was for \$37,500.00.

The Town of Prosper, the request was for \$99,166.00.

And the City of Wichita Falls, the request was for \$114,417.00.

I did want to say that some of these requests they weren't from the law enforcement agencies. They weren't actually present; and it was for one reason or another; and I know historically if an agency wasn't present, then they may not have been considered; but we did have communication with a number of them.

We don't feel like that we clearly spelled it out in the RFA. There might have been some miscommunication that they had to actually be present this week to actually present their overall request; and so we will -- in the future, we will make that



clear in the RFA that you have to be present here to give your presentation, to make your request or it will not be considered.

But with that being said, I did want to provide some additional information this morning for a few of these task forces.

The City of Andrews is requesting \$16,850.00. It's all for equipment. We are seeking the grant to pay for the initial setup fees of \$1,850.00 for five Flock Safety LPR cameras as well as one year of service for the platform at a cost of \$3,000.00 per camera times five for a total of \$15,000.00. The total amount for the first year of the platform is \$16,850.00.

The City of Conroe is requesting a total of \$95,000.00, overtime \$15,000.00. This overtime is to cover Flock Safety LPR camera reviewing for cases, sting operations related to catalytic converter thefts, auto thefts and burglary of motor vehicles. There is also some dollars set aside for an LEO at \$10,000.00 and a crime analyst for \$5,000.00. The total equipment budget is \$80,000.00.

Johnson County is requesting a total of \$250,000.00. It is all equipment. We intend to purchase license plate reading cameras and software



and equipment related to those cameras and the installation of those to identify suspects and suspects' vehicles related to catalytic converter thefts.

The City of Sunset Valley is requesting a total of \$65,625.00. It would be for direct operating expenses. The department plans to use surveillance vehicles for parking lot surveillance in multiple shopping centers, vehicle repair shops, hotel parking lots and large stadium parking lots. The night vision binoculars will assist us in the nighttime operations. The license plate readers slash cameras will supplement our current license plate reader cameras and be placed in locations that are currently not covered. The totals are surveillance vehicle, \$41,667.00, license plate reader cameras, \$21,875.00 and night vision binoculars \$2,0083.00.

The City of Corpus Christi is requesting a total of \$72,408.00 of which overtime will be \$23,474.00. The equipment would be \$45,740.00. There is hydraulic vehicle lifts listed as well as laser engravers listed as well as a thermal surveillance and search drone listed, and then their direct operating expenses total out to be \$3,194.00.

And so with that, Chief Rodriguez, that



will conclude my update on Agenda Item 6A FY24 SB224 catalytic converter grants second solicitation for applications and the recommendation.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, Director Diggs.

I think for the technology, what are we asking in return for measuring as far as the deployments and things like that especially on drones?

DIRECTOR DIGGS: So obviously, we are going to be very interested in the cases that are made, the number of cases that are made, how many times it's deployed. So there will be a number of things that we will be looking at in the coming year, and that will be for all task forces.

We want to take another look at how we look at the successes that the task forces have whether it fits with our traditional task force funding or SB224 funding.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Also on the -- you mentioned it before where maybe we can on mobile cameras, the ones that, you know, they know that they are there, we can start maybe for the next meeting, David, that we can do an item for putting on that type of equipment that it is funded by MVCPA.

I know that we are always talking about



1 how can we put MVCPA out into the public and making sure that other task forces know about it. 2 3 putting that; and if somebody is asking for a marked 4 unit, that it's also displayed there that the vehicle is funded through MVCPA. 5 DIRECTOR DIGGS: That's an excellent 6 7 idea, chief; and I will look forward to helping work with that to make that happen. 8 9 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you. 10 Are there any questions for Director 11 Diggs? It is important for the MVCPA to be physically responsible. MVCPA staff currently believe that additional funds will become available from unspent FY24 funding and additional insurance collection deposits through the state comptroller.

The following agencies have submitted their justification for FY25 task force grant funding. I encourage the grant and budget and reporting committee to recommend to the MVCPA Board to approve the Tier One request above which I will read and to wait until the October MVCPA board meeting to reconsider the Tier II request.

The MVCPA's staff believe that they will have a clear picture in October as it relates to actual additional funding available for FY25 in this strategy.

So in reference to what you mentioned, yes, there is some restructuring. One of the members from Edinburg had been placed for Harlingen. decided to leave one agent from that agency since we had heard there were cops that were possibly joining another task force; but in the case that they did not go with them so they could still have an agent in the task force nevertheless.

I know in the application that we had actually also put Weslaco and that was an oversight on our part. Weslaco was not in the application. decided to back off from it.

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change the amounts and the FTEs that were provided in the application?

We are bringing this back for final adoption. As you recall back at our March 28th meeting, we had proposed or the board proposed this meeting, amendments to 57.36 for a 30-day comment period. It was placed in the Texas Register for that comment period.

We received one comment, public comment that was from a task force member in favor of the amendment.

If you recall, the amendment was precipitated by the need to give the board flexibility in establishing the cash match or the cash match requirement for each year of grant funding.

We kind of were blessed and cursed with SB224 funding in the sense that we got plenty of money to accomplish the mission of the legislation; however, we had a very short time frame and window within which to get the applications and requests for funding and approved, vetted and so on and so forth.

We found out that because we were so far in the fiscal year '24 that most if not all of the grantees did not have a 20 percent cash match that they could -- that would be required under the current rules as currently written back in March.

So to deal with that and also the



1 financial issues that our grantees may have going 2 forward with other funding years, the board approved 3 the amendment to 57.36 to allow flexibility to establish that cash match requirement were not --4 establish a requirement at all. 5 So the board agenda item today is to file 6 7 with the Texas Register for final adoption. This rule if approved by the board during this meeting will be 8 9 published in the August 2nd edition of the Texas 10 Register and will become effective on August the 12th 11 of this year. 12 So all I am asking for now is a vote, 13 motion and a vote to approve the amendments to 57.36 14 for final adoption. 15 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 16 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Are there any questions 17 for Mr. David Richards? 18 Counsel, are there any public comments on 19 this? 20 MS. We will now move on to Agenda Item No. 8, Texas DMV regional service center update.

Members, the Texas DMV Deputy Executive Director Roland Luna will present Agenda Item No. 8.

Mr. Luna.

DIRECTOR LUNA: Good morning, Chairman, board members and Director Diggs.

Roland Luna, deputy executive director with the DMV.

I want to provide an update on what we are doing at the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles as it relates to facilities.

As you all know, we have a strong partnership with MVCPA, and it's important that as we plan for the future either for upgrades to our existing regional service centers or for expanded efforts that we consider the things that are important for the 68A inspections.

We work closely with MVCPA Director Diggs to ensure that we consider the specifications that are needed to conduct 68A inspections and then for officers to have a place to work at the conclusion of that inspection to come inside the regional service center to complete the transaction.



This last legislative session, the DMV was awarded by an appropriated approximately \$3.4 million, an additional FTEs, two stand up and two additional offices, one in Houston and then one in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.

The Vehicle Titles and Registration

Division has conducted a service mapping looking at

all transactions across the State of Texas to

determine what is the ideal location for the new two

regional service centers.

Per perspective, we currently have 16 regional service centers that are strategically placed throughout the state. This will give us a total of 18 regional service centers. Additionally, what we are considering is upgrades and renovations to existing regional service centers.

For example in the San Antonio regional service center, there is a strong partnership with the San Antonio ReACT Task Forces as well as other surrounding task forces where they come to the regional service center on Wednesdays to conduct 68A inspections.

After the inspection, they walk into the regional service center and provide the inspection report to clerks who then finalize the transaction



with the customer.

We are moving that office from its current location off of 1604 Nacogdoches to the Rolling Oaks Mall. It's going to be an ideal location for us. It's larger. The interior has been configured in such a way where it's easier for customers to complete their transactions. There will also be space for officers to work, and we will also have space for our internal enforcement investigators and compliance analysts to go in and conduct their work.

We have renovation projects with the Pharr office as well. We are currently colocated with TXDOT. We will be moving one mile down the road, and we will have a new facility in Pharr.

What's interesting about the Pharr location is as task force operations continue to grow and there continues to be further collaborations with the South Texas task forces, we envision in consultation with Director Diggs, we envision having a space earmarked not only to conduct 68A inspections but should the board choose so to have any type of lift or pit or any other type of enhancements that are provided to that office, we would have that space located and earmarked for MVCPA.



If the board determines that no one lift or a pit is not going to be necessary, you will still have the space that is adequate to conduct 68A inspections.

We are currently considering an upgrade to other facilities as well. One other that I would like to mention is the Odessa office. That office is currently going through a renovation project, and we anticipate that that project will be completed in December of this year. There will be space as well to conduct 68A inspections should officers need to use that location as well.

The reason why we thought that these upgrades were especially important to communicate before the board today is because we understand that the task force officers need to have communication with regional service center employees. We know that they need a location to conduct 68A inspections safely; and some task forces like in the San Antonio area, they do them on designated days in conjunction with the regional service center.

So we wanted to provide that update and if there are any questions about our expansion efforts, I am happy to take those questions now.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Well, this goes back to



the collaboration and the efforts and the support from Texas DMV with MVCPA.

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In the past, this was never, you know, it was never -- this conversation would never have happened. We were always trying to figure out where can we, you know, get better and where the gaps were at; but I can tell you that ever since you and Daniel came onboard, the support has been tremendous; and I know that with this and what you just spoke about, I am going to ask Director Diggs if we can do an assessment of every task force as to how they are doing their 68A's and to see where we can come in and support and especially now that we have this catalytic converter money; and if there is any way that we can expand on what you are doing with your service stations; and if we can expound on that to make sure that we can be more efficient and we provide that customer service to the community that we do that because I think that it's important not only on the trying to prevent the auto thefts and the vehicle clones and all of the other stuff that comes with it; but also to be able to help with the task forces and in a more comfortable environment be able to etch that catalytic converter and be able to check those clone vehicles and things like that.



So definitely I do want to thank you for all of the efforts that you put in for the MVCPA. mean, you are here all week. It says a lot about the commitment, and we are 100 percent also committed to making sure that we continue this collaboration and making sure of this relationship with Texas DMV.

So thank you for that.

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DIRECTOR LUNA: Yes, sir, thank you, chief.

And to further illustrate how we are approaching renovation projects and expansion, Director Diggs joins us on all of those field visits and site visits to ensure that spacing on the exterior is adequate for task force officers so that they can conduct inspections; and will continue to do that as we move forward.

Thank you very much for your kind words.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

MEMBER JONES: Mr. Chair, during the Monday grant budget committee, another task force requested a building; but based on certain statutes and with the direction of counsel, we did not approve the building.

However, I would like for MVCPA and DMV to make Lubbock a priority in trying to figure out --



I know that they are asking for a lift -- to try to figure out how with can best assist them in Lubbock.

DIRECTOR LUNA: Yes, ma'am, Major Jones, thank you.

Roland Luna with DMV.

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We have an office that is located in Lubbock. We have a regional service center there. We are colocated with TXDOT. We have an outstanding relationship with the Department of Transportation, and I am sure that we can work with them to explore how we can use dedicated spacing there to conduct 68A inspections. That's one of our smaller offices; but the district office in particular, there is some room there for growth. So we can add that to our renovation project.

One of the other things that I think is extremely notable as well is what the legislature requires the Texas DMV to do is to conduct a long range facilities plan. So in addition to opening our new offices, we are required to evaluate all of our existing offices as well as where we need to consider placing offices in the future. That's why the service mapping that I talked about at the beginning is so important.

So with the Lubbock office in particular



knowing that there is a need because of geographic considerations, we will certainly prioritize that a little differently.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Williams Diggs, MVCPA Director for the record.

I also want to thank Deputy Executor

Director Luna for the work that he has done with MVCPA since my arrival in the collaboration, and I do feel that it's necessary for me to be able to make those trips with the DMV in looking at these new facilities.

It gives us the ability to point out some things that may or may not work, and we have had a good relationship, and I look forward to that continuing.

I also do want to mention that after Monday, myself and Doug from Lubbock County, we visited. He presented an option that I think gives us a lot of flexibility because I think about some of the challenges that we have around the state when it comes to a permanently mounted lift; and some of the challenges that we may have with the different, you know, the lessees who are leasing these properties from or for that matter being colocated even on TXDOT properties.



1 Doug presented to me a trailer mounted lift which I think is an excellent alternative to 2 giving us all sorts of flexibility even thinking back 3 4 to our recent Dallas visit not just a few weeks ago; and so, I look forward to working with Doug and continuing to look at options as it relate to 68A 6 inspections; and, Doug, thank you for that and the 7 understanding on Monday. 8 9 That's all that I have, sir. 10 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, director. 11 Does anybody else have any questions? 12 Thank you, Roland. 13 We will now move on to Agenda No. 9, the 14 MVCPA logo redesign review and selection. 15 Herman, the lead trainer, will present 16 Agenda Item No. 9, an action item. 17 Is it going to be Earl? 18 MR. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So I think that this is 3 a good starting point, but we need to add more to it. 4 I think that it needs a little bit more to it. 5 DIRECTOR PENCE: A little more color. 6 7 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Yeah, and just because we want to add a little bit more as to also the -- I 8 9 know that the current MVCPA logo has that thin blue 10 line. 11 DIRECTOR PENCE: Yes, sir. 12 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So I just think that we 13 need a little bit more work on it; and maybe just some 14 back and forth; but this is what we are talking about 15 when we are talking about Texas, have that Texas 16 flavor put into it. 17 So, Charla and Rebecca, what do you 18 think? 19 MEMBER BROTHERTON: Are you asking my 20 opinion? 21 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Yes. 22 MEMBER BROTHERTON: That's not fair, 23 Member Brotherton. 24 So if I was looking at these, there are 25 two or three that I like. DIRECTOR DIGGS: Mr. Chairman, if I may.

I know Deputy Director Luna and his background is similar to mine. He may have some input as well.

DIRECTOR LUNA: Hello again, board members. Roman Luna Deputy Director Texas DMV.

After the board has considered in concept what they would like the design to be, I propose that we take that design and then vet that internally.

Our government and strategic communications division helps with our work and helps with all of the public facing designs that we have to ensure that we are not infringing on any copyright or anyone else's intellectual property; and Keith Yawn who is here with us today, he leads those efforts for the Texas DMV to make sure that we are doing the things that we are supposed to be doing internally.

So once the concept has been agreed upon by the board, we will take that and we will refine that in conjunction with Director Diggs and then Mr.



1 Yawn and Director Diggs can bring that back at a 2 future board meeting when it's completed. 3 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay. So then we can pick three, and then we vet it, and then we can move 4 5 on. MEMBER JONES: That was my suggestion. 6 7 So vote on seven. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: 8 MEMBER BROTHERTON: You said the top 9 three. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Well, it's because if 10 11 we would have added color, it would have been 12 different. 13 That's what I was saying, Charla. 14 So we have got No. 3. MEMBER BROTHERTON: Add it in and then 15 16 have them vet it to make sure. 17 MEMBER JONES: No, the majority rules. 18 No, ma'am, the majority rules. 19 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: We have three, four and 20 six. Item No. 23 10, MVCPA training section update. 24 Members, Agenda Item No. 10 will be 25 presented by Deputy Director Earl Pence, lead trainers



Justin White and Amber Ott.

DIRECTOR PENCE: Mr. Chair and board members, for the record, Earl Pence Deputy Director of the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority.

Since our last meeting, we have been doing a lot of good things. There has been several trainings going on.

We have ordered an actual truck and trailer that's going to blast the MVCPA colors and logo.

If we can have that up.

Everything in the truck is going to be a one-ton Ram Tradesman, single axle. It's a bottom line trim package. The trailer is a 14-foot, and it has already been -- the appeal has been issued on it, so we are getting it in the next couple of weeks. The truck should be here after September. Both will have the graphics put on it.

Can we go there, Zac, please, sir?

That is your splash. There may be a change where the blue comes through the middle where they will do an American flag faded through that between the old metal rivet metal and the diamond plate; and, of course, the big shield will be changed to whatever the board suggest we go with on the new



logo.

On the back will be the big cat on the doors of the trailer. It will have the catalytic converter emblem on it and also on the hood of the truck. That's our plan.

Everything that we have gotten so far the total bill is under \$100,000.00. So we shopped. We shopped smart. We have got a diesel that's going to drag it around from event to event, schools, public viewings, trainings; and we are just waiting to get it on the road.

As soon as we get those graphics, we will get those to you all for the truck and that's the idea that we have right now. So as soon as it's finalized, we can't wait to get it to you. I want you all to see it.

I want to hand it over to Justin White.

He is one of our law enforcement trainers. He is

going to update you on some training that he has done

and what we have planned in the future.

MR. WHITE: Thank you.

Good morning.

Justin White. I am one of the MVCPA law enforcement trainers.

So so far since September, we have



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done -- let me get to the right slide there.

So far from September of 2024 to this current month, we have done -- the staff has been at either about four -- it says three -- but it's about four NICV trainings where we have assisted them with our title fraud like an introduction to what the MVCPA does as well as some catalytic converter training.

We have also assisted the DPS at their fraud schools as well as they host some Part 1 and Part 2 auto theft schools as well. Herman is going to be in Amarillo next week for a DPS school.

We have also done some outside training having to do with title fraud. We did a Part 1 school at TAPT in Dallas back in October or the end of September, I believe; and then about just over a month ago, we had one in Conroe, a Part 2 school in Conroe.

So far we are looking at probably about 354 officers and agents and investigators that we have trained so far since September.

Starting with fiscal year '25, we are looking at doing two Part 1 schools, one at TAPT in Lubbock in the early part of October and possibly one down in the South Padre South Texas area.

The same thing with the Part 2 schools in FY24, possibly like the McAllen/Laredo/South Texas



area; and then we are also going to do -- we are also going to work more with the NICB's auto theft schools, some additional Part 1 and Part 2 DPS schools and then possibly some title fraud training to TDLR and some other agencies are requesting it as well.

DIRECTOR PENCE: For the record, Earl Pence, Deputy Director MVCPA.

Let me explain to the board what Part 1 and Part 2 is.

Part 1 on the training that we provide, it goes into auto theft, VIN restoration, VIN recovery. It's a hands-on; and in Part 1, they actually go out to a wrecker yard or a salvage yard. The participants actually get up under the trucks and the trailers. They identify the VINs. They do acid restorations. It's a hands-on, Part 1.

And Part 2 is more classroom. It finishes everything out where they can get their ISO access. ISO is through NICB where they can do 68A inspections and VIN verifications. They have total access, so you have to have those in order to get that ISO access.

So just to familiarize you with what he is talking about, that's what we do; and that's what we are looking at taking it south, north, central, all



over the state. Instead of concentrating in one area, we will spread it around.

If we do more than two, we are going to do more than two; and that's the point to get the guys trained. They have been needing the training.

Historically we haven't had a Part 2 Part One school in four years and these guys are needing it, so they are standing in line.

The one in Conroe filled up within six hours, and it was done, and that was 40 students, and that is about your average that you are going to do per training.

Also next we have got Amber who is going to update you on some stuff that she has been doing with social media and some signs.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Before we go to Amber, I have a quick question.

I know that Member Brotherton had asked about taking the social media training that we got here, the open source to the task forces; and I think it's a great idea to start looking into how much it will cost MVCPA to take the instructor and putting that together in a city that will be able to host it, just to be able to pay for the instructor and be able to get some task forces and maybe other surrounding

areas in those jurisdictions to get into those classes.

I think that social media open source is a great task. The other one maybe be able to read the data from the phone extractions. Let's start looking for something like that, the handling of CI sources, tactical surveillance, those things that the task forces need and see how much it will cost on our end to take those instructors and put it out there who will be able to host a training like that coming from MVCPA.

DIRECTOR PENCE: Yes, sir, I did. I had a conversation with him after that. I heard the comments after the class. I saw the packed house. It's a one deal. He surprised me. I would have hate to have been his kid growing up because I know he ain't getting away with nothing. He said it several times.

Mr. Lofton, we did have a conversation with him. We have also talked to Jim McNally with NICB. I talked to him last night about getting a little more intricate with Part 2 and Part 1, bringing them in and just getting into some of those -- going off into the weeds on some of these subjects.

We have a criteria that we have to



Page 67

follow, but there is nothing that says that you can't add to it and make it better, and that's what we are planning on doing, and that is what we are looking at in the future.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

MS. OTT: Amber Ott, MVCPA.

We have completed the task that you requested the last time of getting all social media platforms up and running, so we now do have an X account. We do have an Instagram up and running, and our Facebook is currently up and running.

We are sharing all events and photos from those events. Even our schools and our local task force, anything that they send to us or that they post on their social media outlets we are sharing there.

I have currently asked for a request from Diggs and Pence to allow us to maybe put somebody into Facebook to push our posts and our Facebook page out there to get more followers. We have had over 1K finally, and we are still climbing each day when I notice that we get more followers. So we are up and running, and we are sharing everything that our task force is doing.

MEMBER BROTHERTON: Member Brotherton.

Have we worked with the individual task

forces to make sure?

I know that Mansfield put something up that was going on because I follow y'all so I follow them, but still do all of the task forces have social media; and are we helping them?

Is there anything in the plan to make sure that they do have it and have the training on it and all of that so that they are -- if they are getting it out and then you are sending it out, then it gets to a broader group, right?

MS. OTT: Correct.

So I did -- Amber Ott, MVCPA -- I did send out an E-mail to all of the task force commanders asking them to send in information. Most of the time every morning we are checking either their Facebook page for task force. Some of them go through their actual police departments. They don't have a separate Facebook for their task force. So we do collect information from that.

If they don't have social media and they don't contact us to let us know that they have an event or anything, we are not showing that information. So I rely heavily on the task force to submit information or it's posted for me to share.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Amber, I have a



question for you.

So when they share the story with you, right, particularly let's just say the Houston Task Force, can we start tagging their senators and their representatives in those areas just to make sure that, you know, the MVCPA is trying to share the story with them.

MS. OTT: Absolutely. Most of the time when I do share their information, I am tagging them along with other hashtags to kind of draw in anything that is related to auto theft and motor vehicle crimes.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay. So on the catalytic converter SB224, I know that there are some agencies that came up to us on Monday and said that they were going to have these events on etching the catalytic converter.

I think that those are great stories to share whenever they do have them, so we can reach out to each and every one of them whenever anything like that happens to make sure that even if they go on a live Facebook, that they are doing it there.

I think that it's important for us to share all of those things because that's what is going to put our name out there and also the fact that the



funding that was provided to us is going to be put to good use.

MS. OTT: And we are sharing those events, and we actually pin those events to the top of our Facebook page for the public, and then we try to re-share them the day before or the day of that those are happening again, but we do keep those pinned at the top of the page.

We have also started going out into the field trying to hit some of those events as well as going out to the 68A inspections and visiting with the task force there.

I actually went out with Tarrant County on those 68A inspections recently and kind of visited with them and got to know their processes, and I am trying to get around to each task force.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, Amber.

So when we started, how many followers did we have?

MS. OTT: Like 400-and-something. I will have to go back and look. I am not sure exactly on that.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Now, we have a thousand.

MS. OTT: We are over a thousand. We are



like at 1,500 a month.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Great job.

MS. OTT: In fact, we talked about maybe doing a swag bag if we can get to 2k and then give it away. Whoever is our 2k follower, we will give a swag bag away from MVCPA.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: We will celebrate big. Thank you.

MS. OTT: You are welcomed.

DIRECTOR PENCE: But that's about it for the update for the training division if you have any questions.

MEMBER JONES: Member Jones for the board.

Now, what I heard about the social media, great job with the one hundred percent improvement. I will also like to remind your team, Earl, that one of the big suggestions from the last meeting was to have a statewide coordinating etching effort and host that with your social media and let's see how it goes and make sure that PIOs are involved for each agency and definitely for DMV as well.

DIRECTOR PENCE: That's a good idea.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

DIRECTOR PENCE: Thank you.



CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Members, we are now moving on to Agenda Item No. 11, 2025 conference venue recommendation and selection.

Member Jones.

MEMBER JONES: Next year, Mr. Chairman, we have now narrowed down our conference to be in the Dallas/Fort Worth area. We are hoping for Fort Worth near the stockyard. We do have a hotel proposal from a hotel that's two miles from the stockyard, and we also have a proposal from a second hotel that's in the Dallas area.

In speaking with the Dallas Task Force members, their choice is they are pushing towards the stockyard.

Also those of you who are in the Dallas/Fort Worth area, and I am going to help you out. If you look at the Texas DPS map, it says, "Region 1 or North Texas area," you are included in this next year's coordination effort. So all task forces in that area are going to share the load as well as throughout the state when it comes to gathering sponsorships.

Executive Diggs and I, the executive director, we had a conversation on some thoughts about changing the conference event. So one of the things



that we constantly heard throughout the Senate Bill 224 committee meetings is that there is definitely a disconnect between law enforcement and the auto parts industry, the auto dealers, recyclers and insurance. However, our training has to be for law enforcement purposes as well as law enforcement sensitive.

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So the thought process is for next year to have the grant committee meeting and the board meeting in October because we have a meeting in October already scheduled for 2025 and in August --July of this week for Fort Worth, those are the dates that we gave to the hotel, for that week have the first three days where it's law enforcement only; and then Days 4 and 5 could be for the industry where we have insurance companies, auto dealerships, auto parts; and let them present to us so that we are hearing each other's effort; and we present to them as well.

So we are not excluding those who are in law enforcement because this year we excluded a lot of non-commissioned who actually have a lot of input and direction in what we do and should be heard inclusive of the community members as well.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So for law enforcement, it would be five days?



MEMBER JONES: Three, sir.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And Days 4 and 5, who is the industry going to present to?

MEMBER JONES: To us. It's still going to be -- it's a five-day conference, yes, sir; but since we cannot include non law enforcement in our training and even here we had some vendors who were like, "Hey, I have something to say; but I can't say it. I can't go into your meeting;" and so we have been hearing this throughout our meeting with Senate Bill 224 that there is definitely a disconnect.

We acknowledge that there is a disconnect. We hear it at every meeting that we go to, and we learn from each other. Like the very first Senate Bill 224 meeting, there was a discussion about regulation; and law enforcement is like, "Yes, pass a bill. Pass a law. Let's put them all in jail;" and then the auto industry said, "If you over regulate, then there is also a downside to other states and out of the country."

And then there was a discussion about etching where law enforcement is for 100 percent for etching but the auto industry is not because they think that we want to regulate them to etch before the converters leave the floor; and so they gave an



excellent explanation as to why that would be a problem from their end; and then we have to explain to them that why we need to etch it.

And something else that's very important is that they are beginning to understand that you can give us a hundred million dollars without prosecution. We are going to do our job, of course. They were under the impression that law enforcement was against Senate Bill 224 and against the industry. We are not.

It's just that they need to understand when we take a case to the prosecution, "Hey, will you take this case;" and they tell us, "No," the answer is no. So there is definitely a disconnect between our executive powers as law enforcement and the industry that do not understand. So there is a lot to learn from either side.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Awesome.

So we are moving to October.

Is Stacy here or somebody from TAPT?

Can you come forward, please?

I know that TAPT has their conference in October, correct?

MR. STACY: Reid Stacy, Dallas PD, past president of TAPT.

Yes, so our conference is typically held



1 also in October; but she was speaking in 2025 being this time this month so there is no conflict there; 2 but was there a follow-up with the October date? 3 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Yes. So we are 4 thinking of doing the executive board meeting and the 5 GBR meetings in October, right? 6 7 MEMBER JONES: Correct. I think that we have dates already, 8 9 right, Mr. Diggs? Do we have dates for 2025? 10 11 DIRECTOR DIGGS: We do actually have 12 dates already posted on our website. 13 MR. STACY: I don't have those exact 14 dates for the 2025. We will be here in Houston in 15 I do know that off the top of my head though I 16 think it is that last week of September into that 17 first week of October. Hold on one second. I think 18 that I took a picture. 19 If you will give me one second. 20 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Sure. 21 The reason I am asking is because if we 22 are having a board meeting and TAPT is going to be 23 having their conference, it's going to be a problem 24

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dates right here. For our 2025 conference here in Houston, it's our conference will start September the 28th, so that's okay; and it just runs through the 3rd of October which is a Friday.

MEMBER JONES: Mr. Chairman, I have gotten several -- I don't want to say suggestions -- just several discussions or thoughts about combining the conferences, tag teaming. I am just putting that out there. Just there are pros and cons. It doesn't make it MVCPA. It's combined, but we are not doing basically the same type of training.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: I understand.

MR. STACY: If I can address that.

I think that it was probably four years ago that we were in San Marcos; and I presented that to the board because sometimes we may be duplicating our efforts; and we are utilizing the same trainers; and something that you have to tackle is that are we sending our same task force members or our investigators through the same training; and at the same time, are we taking them away from the caseload of their work for two weeks out of a very tight period, you know, from July until September/October.

And that's why I can't speak 100 percent on TAPT, but I can present it back to the board if



it's something that we would like to kind of get together and communicate through. It would be a dual effort. It can be branded MVCPA and then TAPT, of course, because we are all the same. You know, it's right hand left hand. We are all together in this.

You know, probably there is 350 members in TAPT; and I guarantee you that the vast majority are either task force or were task force at one time.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And I think for some agencies it works perfect; and I can tell you from the Laredo side that it works perfect because we send half of our group to the MVCPA conference and the other half to our TAPT conference, so it works out really good; but I know that there has to be additional conversation just so we don't duplicate on the same trainings and we send the same investigators and the same crew to those conferences.

So definitely we can continue that conversation. I just want to make sure also that the board meeting, we are not having it somewhere else; and you guys are in Houston; and then we are also trying to put a board meeting especially a GBR one where we are presenting on our grants; and then, you know, everybody is going to be at the conference, so we just want to make sure that we continue to have

Gina is a major asset as an analyst to the MVCPA Task Force with her attention to detail and wisdom of the databases that she uses.

Gina not only assists with the hundreds of phone calls each week but has also assisted with the Galveston Task Force commander with her grant MVCPA quarterly meetings, trainings, etc.

Members, Director William Diggs will present Agenda Item 12.

Mr. Diggs.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Williams Diggs, Director MVCPA for the record.

Mr. Chairman and members, on Page 36 of your board book, you will find information related to Agenda Item No. 12.

Currently 68A inspections are only required for certain circumstances. Myself and Deputy Executive Director Luna met with Chief Mike Rodriguez

in Laredo a few weeks back and we discussed a proposal that the Texas DMV is going to put towards the 89th Legislative session in reference to expanding when a 68A inspection could take place.

Today this is not an action item. It's just a briefing only; and if the 89th Legislative session adopts a statutory change, then the recommendation is going to be that you, Chief Rodriguez, that you could assign me to a chair working group of MVCPA staff, MVCPA grantees, task forces around Texas and that we could identify when certain situations could require a 68A inspection and bring that back to the MVCPA Board to the executive office of the Texas DMV; and then that could further move to a rule adoption that would be adopted by the Texas DMV and would require circumstances when additional 68A inspections could take place; and that could help us reduce some fraud related to motor vehicle crimes and also, of course, recovering stolen vehicles that are in Texas.

And so today again, it's just a briefing only; and that's all that I have.

I will be glad to take any questions.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Are there any questions

for Director Diggs?

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Thank you, Mr. Diggs.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Thank you.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: We will now move on to the next agenda item, Agenda Item No. 13, FY 24 supplanting report conducted by the MVCPA audit section.

Members, Agenda Item 13 will be presented by the audit's staff Sterling Fielder and Lauren Williams.

MS. WILLIAMS: My name is Lauren Williams. I am a grant auditor with the MVCPA; and again, I will be going through the FY22 and FY23 supplanting process by the MVCPA.

To start with a very brief definition.

The definition of supplanting is just the replacement of other funds with MVCPA grant funds, and a little bit of background.

Through 2017, supplanting was a concern and was tested for annually. After 2017, due in part to the implementation of GMTS as well as the requirement that cash match could not be reduced at least not more than five percent or in proportion to the reduction of the grant amount.

The need for the testing for supplanting was eliminated but from FY21 to FY22, the reduction in



match requirement to 20 percent. To changed that, it was mentioned at this point that it could impact supplanting and then most grantees understood that the supplanting rules could not change -- will not change and move the cash match overage to in-kind match. This would have demonstrated that the local contribution made by grantees year over year would not be reduced.

In FY22, the allowance of match rate reduction again required supplanting testing to be resumed.

Typically, year end financial statements were required to accurately determine expenditures.

These financial statements are not usually available until Q2 of the following fiscal year which in this case was FY23.

Because FY23 year end close out was delayed, we did include FY23 in the supplanting test and that's why we are discussing that today. It was determined during the initial review that 15 grantees were in the range of possibility for supplanting.

If you all will look in your board book, you can see the initial test here. This was kind of an again what determined which grantees we took a closer look at. So the ones there indicated in red



are the ones that had supplanting concerns initially.

At this point, the audit team then tested for supplanting in six different ways for each of those 15 grantees. This included year over year cash amount in budget, year over year cash match percent in budget, year over year cash match actual amount, year over year cash match actual percent, year over year match and in-kind amount and year over year match and in-kind percent.

After testing the above calculations for all 15 of those grantees that you will see there on the page prior, three grantees were determined not to have supplanted at all.

The audit team then contacted the remaining 12 grantees and asked them if there were any previously undisclosed or unreported expenditures for the baseline, again, FY21 or the other years in question, FY22 and FY23.

The grantees were encouraged to review our initial assessment and our calculations and to present any documentation or rational that they felt applicable.

Based on the documentation that we received in response, five grantees were eliminated for the possibility of supplanting. This left seven



grantees with supplanting concerns of which four were able to reduce their supplanting amount by providing us with those previously undisclosed expenditures.

On the next page you will see the communication timeline. We have worked hand-in-hand with our grantees trying to again remedy this issue.

So on 3/15, MVCPA sent out our initial request for additional information to those 12 grantees. We received our first response on the 18th; and at this point, grantees were providing ledgers and unreported expenditures, asking questions, requesting clarification and providing any explanations and/or proposing new calculations.

We had a lot of our grantees that would completely re-do the spreadsheet that they were provided.

MVCPA in response was responding to questions, E-mails, requests for phone calls, updating our calculations, requesting new information as well as completing some site visits in order to help with this concern.

We received what we considered to be the final or most conclusive response from all of our grantees on the dates listed below, so you all can find those there to kind of view the timeline again of



how much communication was occurring with all of these grantees.

After reviewing all responses that we received from our grantees, we determined that the seven grantees below appear to have supplanted in the following amounts. Please, do note that this is the smallest amount that was found out of those six calculations to have been reduced by five percent materiality allowance.

These grantees include the City of
Beaumont, the City of Brownsville, Burnet, Eagle Pass,
Galveston County, Harris County and the City of
Pasadena and in the amount totaling approximately
\$1.7 million.

There are a few ways that we are looking for compliance to be documented. Some of those include fiscal or programmatic documents to confirm that, in the absence of grant funds, the grantee would have eliminated staff or services in the years in question.

Any board meetings or minutes or agendas with discussion of elimination of staff due to local or state funds, state or local legislative actions, itemized budget histories from one year to the next as well as supporting information and actual reduction in

state or local funds, some size data from previous years or any upcoming years and anything of that nature again in addition to those unreported expenditures.

All of this is rooted in the fact that supplanting defeats the purpose. Supplementing is the point. Of course, we will always want to draw more funds to these task forces in this great State of Texas rather than taking those away or maintaining the same levels, then we want to make sure that we stay there.

Here on the next page, the Texas

Education Agency provides some guidance here; and they
kind of expand on their website publicly what they do
in response to issues as such.

MVCPA actions, the standard practice would, of course, be for us to recoup those funds. With that being said, if the MVCPA Board wants to provide some relief or take any other administrative action, you all may hear the discussion at any regular scheduled board meeting and make a decision in open meeting.

That's all that I have for you all, but I would love to take any questions that you may have.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Do you have any

1 questions, Charla or Sharon? 2 MEMBER BROTHER: No. 3 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: I do have a question, 4 Lauren. MS. WILLIAMS: Yes. 5 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: The ones that are on --6 the final five, the ones that sent the explanation, 7 for example, Galveston. 8 9 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes. 10 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: After the explanation, 11 you were able to determine that they were not 12 supplanting. 13 Is that why they are not in this? 14 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, correct. 15 Galveston was excluded from that based on the responses that they provided. 1 guess, when this would end or the system would stop 2 anyone from reducing their cash match year over year. 3 So we took that and compared it to FY22 and FY23 both. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: After we found that 4 this final, one, two, three, four, five six, this 5 final six or this final seven agencies, have they 6 already, I guess, taken care of the issue after you 7 have announced to them that they were, in fact, in 8 9 violation? 10 MS. WILLIAMS: We have received responses 11 from all seven grantees. I don't think that the 12 concern has been remedied necessarily, so these are 13 the numbers that still remain at this point in time. 14 MEMBER BROTHERTON: Member Brotherton. 15 So Galveston is one of the seven, or they 16 have remedied already? 17 MS. WILLIAMS: They have not -- sorry. Ι 18 didn't -- sorry -- Lauren Williams MVCPA. 19 Galveston still is present on here as 20 part of the one of the seven. 21 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So we have Beaumont, 22 Brownsville, Burnet, Galveston County. 23 MS. WILLIAMS: That will be up to you 20 all. 21 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay, but there was a 22 recommendation? 23 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes. 24 Thank you, CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay.

1 Members, do you have any questions for 2 Lauren? 3 MEMBER BROTHERTON: No. MS. WILLIAMS: Thank you so much. 4 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: We will call the City 5 6 of Beaumont, please. 7 MS. THOMPSON: Bailey Thompson grant accountant for the City of Beaumont. I have some 8 9 documents. Can I give them to you? 10 11 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Sure. 12 MS. THOMPSON: Okay. So the E-mail chain 13 that you are looking at, that is the correspondence 14 between me and Lauren. It just kind of shows how they 15 got their calculations; and there was some changes 16 along the way so the one on the first page is the most 17 current calculations that they provided for us; and 18 then on the spreadsheet that I gave you guys, those 19 are the calculations that we did internal at the City 20 of Beaumont. 21 There were many conversation between us 22 and Lauren and Dan regarding this. One of the things 23 that Dan had said to us was that basically you guys 24 are looking for us to spend the exact dollar amount at



least year to year to year.

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For fiscal year '21 our grant amount was \$919,000.00; and then moving to fiscal year '22 and '23, it actually reduced. So the calculations that we did, we actually took -- we basically wanted to compare apples to apple, so we took the percentage of the reduction and took that into effect for fiscal year '21, so it reduced our supplanting numbers quite significantly, so for fiscal year '22 the supplanting amount was only \$59,000.00; and then in fiscal year '23, it's only \$1,000.00.

So we just wanted to kind of show that because if our spending is being reduced, then it's not always, I guess, capable for us to continue to spend the same amount.

Also in fiscal year '23, I do want to note that we had one of our counties drop out unexpectedly in the middle of the year so we did try to recoup a lot of those funds and continued to spend; but it just wasn't enough time left to spend everything.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So the grant budget for 2021 was \$919,000.00.

MS. BAILEY: That is correct.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And then it was reduced to \$732,000.00, that's what you are saying?



1 MS. BAILEY: It actually was reduced to 2 \$720,951.00, but we spent \$732,246.83 and then in 3 fiscal year '23, we spent \$751,422.00, so we still 4 spent more than the grant budget; but, I guess, it just still wasn't enough according to the calculations. 6 Okay. So the request 7 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: was \$919,000.00, that's what you are telling me; and 8 9 what was granted was \$720,000.00, correct? 10 MS. BAILEY: No, I am not sure what the 11 request was for fiscal years '22 and '23; but what was 12 awarded was \$720,951.00. That was for '22 and '23. 13 For fiscal year '21 the amount that was awarded was 14 \$919,010.00. So from '21 to '22 and '23, the grant 15 16 budget dropped almost \$200,000.00 if I am doing that 17 correctly. 18 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So do you know how they 19 came to \$919,000.00, Director Diggs? DIRECTOR DIGGS: William Diggs, Director 20 21 MVCPA for the record. 22 Chief Rodriguez, you know in light of the 23 new information that is presented this morning or this 24 afternoon rather -- I guess it's still this morning



just slightly -- I would like to yield back to Lauren

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1 to answer any questions when it comes to any 2 additional calculations that may be provided today if that would be okay with you, sir. 3 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Yes, absolutely. 4 I just wanted to make sure that -- well, I think Lauren should be able to answer that. 6 7 MEMBER JONES: Do we have another seat for Lauren, please? 8 9 MS. WILLIAMS: Lauren Williams, MVCPA 10 grant auditor. 11 So if you all will actually turn to the 12 E-mail that she provided as well. That first number, 13 the \$919,000.00, would be the year-to-date 14 expenditures, so that was the total amount that was 15 spent including MVCPA funds as well as the match 16 amount. 17 So that was the 919; and then I am 18 thinking I believe it's the same one here. 19 Yes, so that \$508,000.00 is the reimbursement from the MVCPA, so that \$410,387.00 that 20 21 you see is the match amount coming from Beaumont. 22 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And then for '22, it went down to \$148,295.00, is that what I am seeing? 23 24 MS. WILLIAMS: Correct.



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So the match amount was reduced from

1 410 -- yeah, 410,387 to \$148,295.83. 2 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: But our reimbursement continued to be at \$500,000.00; is that correct. 3 4 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, that's correct, our reimbursement was \$583,951.00. 5 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So this is where it 6 7 comes to the violation for the supplanting? The first line, yes. 8 MS. WILLIAMS: 9 MEMBER JONES: So, Lauren, are you saying 10 your numbers are accurate based on what was provided? 11 Ma'am, do you have a rebuttal? 12 MS. BAILEY: Even though the Beaumont 13 portion decreased in fiscal year '22, that is where I 14 would like to add that our grant budget also decreased; but if you look down on the next line where 15 16 the calculations are for the in-kind match, our 17 in-kind match did increase over \$100,000.00, like 18 \$110,000.00 from fiscal year '21 to '22; and then it 19 also increased again in fiscal year '23 even though 20 our grant budget was still less than it was in '21. 21 We were trying to spend more money. We 22 just couldn't spend enough; and also in fiscal year 23 '21, we did get some equipment, so that is something 24 that we got in that year that we don't typically get



every year that cost more money as well.

Many of them provided responses which did responses. alter our understanding of their actual spending behaviors, and we did take those into account in the numbers presented for our calculation for the supplanting.

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The other thing that I wanted to mention was the assertion that is slightly inaccurate on what we had discussed with them. One is we do allow a five percent materiality allowance, so if somebody drops by five percent, we consider it to be nonconsequential. We will allow that year over year.

The other thing is that the baseline number is the high watermark, so if we have not been able to get their expenditure reports closed or their audits provided to us, those are normally done in the middle of the year following the end of the fiscal year if one of those are completed. If those numbers are not available to us, we cannot complete the calculations on supplanting accurately. So as a consequence, the baseline is the high watermark.

So if they supplanted the first year and they continue to spend at a low level, we will still use the high watermark as the benchmark.

I should have done it when I was up here, but I needed to talk to Bailey to make sure that that was what she understood, so just to add a little context to that.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

City of Brownsville.

COMMANDER PASCHALL: Good morning.

I am Commander James Paschall with the Brownsville Police Department. I am representing the South Texas Auto Theft Enforcement Task Force which is in the Rio Grande Valley.

The South Texas Auto Theft Enforcement
Task Force has been part of the Motor Vehicle Crime
Prevention for the past 31 years. We came in on year
one of funding in 1993.

I have been with the Brownsville Police Department for 35 years. Our responsibility covers the fiscal management of the police department which includes the administration of the auto theft grant.

I work alongside the police department's accountant, Ms. Imelda Trejo, who is sitting right next to me. We have worked together for the past 25 years.

Imelda and I conducted a forensic audit based on the allocation by the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority that we were supplanting our budget. We determined in the investigation that there was no evidence to support the allegation.

Furthermore, the baseline used for the reference for the allegation is flawed; and it's not sufficient to support the claim of supplanting.

If you will go to Page 2 in your packet, and it's marked as Slide No. 1.

The allegations of supplanting is based on the net difference between the year-to-date expenditures and the reimbursement using the 2021 grant as a baseline or basis for comparison.

What we are talking about is the cash match reported. The cash match reported in the 2021 grant is more than the cash match in the grant for '22 and '23. Using the cash match of '21 subtracting it from the cash match of '22 and subtracting it from '22 and '23 gives us the discrepancies. The entire allegation is based solely on the cash match this represents.

If you go to Slide No. 2 which would be the next page, let's take a look at it.

The yellow highlighted areas are the cash match, and the green highlighted areas are the difference in the discrepancy.

In '21 the cash match was \$945,668.55.

In '22 the cash match was \$763,408.96. Subtracting the two gives us the discrepancy of \$148,458.59.

Likewise, the cash match in 2023 was \$723,816.35.

Subtract that from the '21 grant and you get a discrepancy of \$188,051.20.

Why the difference?
Why the discrepancy?

If you will go to Slide No. 3 on the next page.

One difference is the actual expenses. The actual expenses of the grants are highlighted in yellow. In the 2021 grant, the total expenses were \$1.8 million, \$1.7 million in 2022 and \$1.6 million in 2023.

If you have more actual expenses, your cash match will go up. Less actual expenses, then your cash match will go down. That's what happened in this case. Each subsequent grant shows fewer actual expenses and the cash match went down accordingly.

That's one of the reasons for the discrepancy.

Let's take another look at reasons for the discrepancy.

If you go to the next slide, Slide 4.

In this slide, the reimbursement rate is highlighted in yellow. As you will notice, the reimbursement rate is different from the 2021 grant compared to the '22 and '23 grants.

The reimbursement rate for 2021 was 48 percent. The reimbursement rate for '22 and '23 was 57 percent, a nine percent difference. This, too, was to the comparisons of the grant results. A smaller reimbursement rate will increase the cash match portion of your grant.

Let's look at an example of this. Let's go to Slide 5.

This is a slide show being a side-by-side comparison of the effects of reimbursement rates.

This is our fiscal 2023 grant in the first column. I used this grant because it shows the largest discrepancy of \$188,051.20. The reimbursement rate for the 2022 grant was 57 percent.

Looking at the second highlighted column using the reimbursement rate of the 48 percent in the 2021 grant, you will see that the discrepancy is



Page 105

reduced to \$74,217.56. That is nearly a \$114,000.00 difference just by the reimbursement rate.

To use the 2021 grant as a baseline and make it an apples to apples comparison, you need to use the same reimbursement rate.

If you will go to Slide No. 6.

Another issue that we found using the 2021 grant as a baseline for comparison is that the 2021 grant had a lieutenant's position. This position was eliminated in the '22 and '23 grants. That reduced the actual expenses in the '22 and '23 grants by \$130,759.11.

As previously stated, having fewer actual expenses lowers a cash match in the grant thus causing a discrepancy when compared to the baseline which included a lieutenant's position. To use the 2021 grant as a baseline, you need to account for the absent lieutenant's position in '22 and '23.

Slide No. 7.

When cities or counties submit reimbursement for grants, they use a general ledger also known as an accounting ledger. They use this ledger as backup for reimbursement. This ledger consolidates all financial data and to detail accounts such as revenue and expenses.

During our audit, we found an error with the city's ledger. We found that one of our auto theft investigators who was transferred to the grant since June of 2022 was not listed on the ledger. Because of this error, there has been no submissions of expenses for this investigator. This accounts for \$22,722.93 for the 2022 grant and \$98,973.00 for the 2023 grant.

Because the expenses were not requested for reimbursement, that lowered our actual expenses; therefore, lowering our cash match in the grant again causing a discrepancy compared to the baseline.

If you will go to Slide No. 8.

For us to more accurately compare the grants, we need to do an apples to apples comparison to include the lieutenant's salary in all three grants. We need to also add the investigator's cost that were not recorded in the '22 and '23 grants; and finally, we need to use the same reimbursement rate for all three grants.

As you can see by the slide, with all of the same perimeters in place, a true apples to apples comparison, we have a surplus in both the '22 and '23 grants with regard to the cash match.

As stated in the opening, we found no

evidence to support the allegations of supplanting.

Next week we will be submitting this to Lauren, and she will verify that this is correct at least to show for the grant, but that's what we have got.

Are there any questions?

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Mr. Chairman, I have one question. William Diggs MVCPA Director for the record.

Prior to now, had you recently submitted any of this information in reference to the lieutenant or the other investigator that you bring forward today?

COMMANDER PASCHALL: We were working with Lauren last week and all the way until Friday with Lauren. We came across part of it on Friday. She went home Friday night and found more. Saturday we worked. Sunday we worked. I worked with our finance people on Monday to say, "Hey, you have got an error on your ledger;" and so it was a work in progress.

Lauren helped us greatly because when we first looked at I said, "Where are we going to go," you know, when we were trying to look at it; but when we dissected it, just break it down like you would a criminal doing a white collar crime, once you start

trying to prove the crime and break it all down, it starts making sense.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: So the information that we see today is relatively fresh, not in the last two or three months then?

COMMANDER PASCHALL: No, sir, it's not.

Lauren was very helpful with us to help us be able to see where the errors were.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Thank you, sir.

I have no further questions.

MS. WILLIAMS: Lauren Williams.

Yeah, I have my records right here from our conversation; and it looks like -- and correct me if I am wrong -- the last time that we touched bases was on Friday, the 12th; and after the five percent allowance, the calculations for FY22 is \$141,035.00. Of course, this isn't updated in the book. It was too late for that; and for FY23, it was \$178,648.64.

So again, that's not reflected in the book. I think that you can find that here in the presentation. So everything further I think was done over the weekend by them all. So I haven't had the chance again to take a look at these calculations outside of right now; but when we left off, yes, we are at \$141,000.00 for FY21 and \$178 for a combined



total of around \$319,000.00 between the two years.

COMMANDER PASCHALL: So based on the work over the weekend, we can account for every bit of this. In fact, we have surpluses. If you are going cash match against cash match, we got it.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So after this that was provided today, are you comfortable with what was given to you; or do we need to continue the conversation with Brownsville?

DIRECTOR DIGGS: I think that next week we will finish it up, we will confirm; and we are done.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And again, I think that this is a good item that we are going over. I think, you know, MVCPA is one of the few grants that grants FTEs, grants equipment, grants overtime; and this is a grant that has to be really taken care of throughout any city or any county, so I appreciate you putting that sense of urgency and making sure that you provide the information that was needed.

I think that I will allow Lauren and Mr. Price here to make sure that we continue to have the conversation to make sure that everything that you provide is accurate.

COMMANDER PASCHALL: Yes, sir.



1 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you. 2 Are there any other questions? 3 MEMBER JONES: Are you going to give a 4 time frame or a timeline to get that? COMMANDER PASCHALL: It will be next 5 week. 6 7 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Lauren, how much time do we need? 8 9 MS. WILLIAMS: I can meet with them next 10 week. 11 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay. Thank you, 12 Captain. 13 I appreciate. 14 Burnet County. 15 MEMBER BROTHERTON: Member Brotherton. 16 Before we go any further, can I ask 17 Lauren a question? 18 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Yes, absolutely. 19 I know that you gave MEMBER BROTHERTON: 20 this to them like earlier and then when was the -- not 21 particularly one particular person. I am just talking 22 about in general. 23 What was their timeline to get that to 24 you? MS. WILLIAMS: So it was different for 25



each grantee.

Are we speaking specifically about this one?

MEMBER BROTHERTON: No, I am not speaking specifically. I didn't know if you said I need all of these back by, I don't know, June the 1st or whatever it is?

MR. PRICE: Yeah, so this is Dan Price, MVCPA grant manager.

I signed off on the initial letter; and in the initial letter we gave them until the end of the month. So it was about two-and-a-half weeks to respond, and some of them responded and some of them did not. That would have been in March. So we have given them a fair amount of time to respond to this.

I would also like to clarify just for the record for everybody in the room, the reimbursement rate is a product of their cash match. It is not a consequence. It is a result, and so what we are actually looking at is the actual cash match. We also look at it as absolute dollars percentages.

When we look at it both as cash match and cash match plus in-kind, we calculated it six different ways; and if any of those ways indicate that they are not supplanting, we accept that result. So a



1 lot of what you have heard up here is not 2 comprehensive of the working analysis that was 3 performed, but we will review it with them. 4 MEMBER JONES: Are you stating that the testimony of Beaumont and the City of Brownsville 5 regardless of what they have presented, that your 6 7 numbers are accurate because you said that you did it 8 multiple ways? 9 MR. PRICE: If there are additional 10 expenses that they have identified that have never 11 been reported to us when requested or in the system, 12 that is something that we should probably take into 13 consideration. 14 Anything that has been previously 15 reported to us prior to this week has been 16 comprehended. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: But all data has to be 17 18 vetted. 19 MR. PRICE: Yes. 20 MS. WILLIAMS: If I may, Ms. Lauren 21 Williams MVCPA grant auditor. 22 I wanted to expand on your question just 23 a little bit. 24 We sent first before we sent any letters



or again included calculation any of those 15 or 12

grantees at that point that we had supplanting concerns about. We first sent again on 3/15, I sent out requests and as well as Sterling Fielder to our grantees for additional unreported expenditures because again if those were provided, three of those grantees were able to provide unreported expenditures that made up for this supplanting amount, this supplanting concern amount; and so they never even had to receive a letter that said, "Here are the calculations."

So the timeline started on 3/15. The official letter came about, I think, a month later around the date that he was discussing.

MR. PRICE: Without spending too much time getting into it, the word supplanting is kind of a shocking word for a lot of people in the grant world; and when I initially sent a first letter or two out, there was a very sharp and marked response from people who were extremely upset that there was a possibility of supplanting.

So we decided at the beginning to just request the information about what was your total spent during the month of March. Please, tell us everything you spent on the grant; and we only requested that from people where there was a question



as to whether they had supplanted or not. We did not send that to every single grantee. Many of them did that.

The other thing is that there was discussion before the board back in 2020/2019 when the match rate was reduced. There was testimony from grantees as well as from the then director Brian Wilson indicating that even though the match rate was being reduced, that that does not change the supplanting calculations and requirements and that you still are not being allowed to supplant.

So, for example, Jordan from Houston who was their financial officer came to testify. He moved the spending from cash match into in-kind, and he was knocked down to a supplanting because he just re-characterized the spend. The spend remained constant, so many of the other grantees followed that example and did that, and they are not before you today.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

Burnet County.

COMMANDER STEINHOUR: Howard Steinhour,

Heart of Texas Auto Theft Task Force commander.

Thank you for allowing me to speak.

Real quick before I get going, I want to

thank Dan and Lauren for coming to Burnet to help us with this because our auditor's office was adamant that this was not supplanting. They kept telling me, "Howard, this is not supplanting." They got confused with it all, too, so we had to go through all of this; and I have got a little blip.

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Janet could not be here due to jury duty, so she gave me a little bit of writing; and I will read this to you if you don't mind.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: You are the man.

COMMANDER STEINHOUR: So basically she goes on to say during the fiscal year from 2016 all the way through 2021, grant awards decreased causing the Heart of Texas Auto Theft Task Force to terminate employees.

Okay, I am sorry.

The Heart of Texas Auto Theft Task Force had to terminate employees or decrease or match. During this time, we continued the coverage area that we serve. We were unable to continue to sustain the administrative assistant starting in 2020.

So this brought up COVID. The 68A's increases for the areas. This allowed us to have a high balance in program income which allowed us to continue our program income with permission as a cash



| match.

In FY22, Limestone County was dropped from the task force. We were told that since we went from three counties to two counties, we can act as if we were a new entity and only have to match 20 percent. MVCPA approved the application with 20 percent cash match.

We signed a statement of grant award.

FY23 was approved with the same amount. For '24,

McLennan and Williamson Counties were interested in

joining. We were told again that since we were

joining from two counties to four counties, we could

act as a new entity with cash match of 20 percent.

Although the Williamson County commissioners chose at the last minute not to join, we went ahead with the grant as awarded. Of course, we didn't spend that money; and if you don't spend it, we don't get it.

In March of 2024, we were notified by MVCPA requesting any additional expenditures with '22 and '23 to determine if supplanting was happening during those years. We were told to use FY21 as a base year in calculating the supplanting and how much we would owe.

Calculating with Burnet County only

expenditures, the in-kind expenditures and estimated in-kind utilizing the sheriff and his assistant and the grant manager with a portion of their salaries as in-kind and calculating the total difference from FY21 less five percent as the total amount at \$24,903.42.

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Because we signed the statement of the grant reward, we feel that the amount on the document should be the amount that we are required to match especially since we were told that we could apply as a new entity with a 20 percent match.

We purchased a vehicle with 100 percent program income in FY21. This affected the reimbursement rate. Even though the grant did not reimburse any of the amount of the vehicle by removing the vehicle purchased in '21 to determine the supplanting difference, the amount owed would be down to \$12,405.47. That's basically how we got into that situation.

We were losing members and gaining We were trying to stay with the same grant; but we got told, "Hey, go back to '21 and use that as your baseline," which again like the others said, I think the reimbursement rate is what throws everybody off is what we are having issues with.

After Dan and Lauren showed up, they



1 explained it and the board had the auditor in there 2 and our grant writer. I think that we came to an 3 agreement. My understanding is we came to an 4 agreement and everything was settled at that point. MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, the amounts I think it was -- let's see-- April 11th that we were provided 6 7 the calculations that we have accepted that are reflected in the board book. 8 9 These amounts are what you are talking 10 about? 11 COMMANDER STINEHOUR: Yes, ma'am. 12 MS. WILLIAMS: So those are accurately 13 represented in what you see in front of you; is that 14 correct? 15 COMMANDER STINEHOUR: Yes. 16 MEMBER BROTHERTON: Member Brotherton. 17 So you are still saying that he 18 supplanted \$132,000.00? 19 MS. WILLIAMS: \$132,717.00. 20 MR. PRICE: For the record, Dan Price 21 MVCPA grant manager. 22 I would like to also thank Howard and the audit staff with Burnet for the work that they did on 23 24 this with us. The amount that we had initially



estimated that they had supplanted was much higher;

but due to the turnover in the local sub-jurisdictions that are under that grant, we allowed them; and the fact that they have been removed, we allowed them to adjust accordingly to eliminate the people who are no longer with the program from the calculation and that reduced this amount greatly.

So thank you, Howard.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, Howard; and I think, you know, I know that when you talked about sending those letters and some people take it offensive; and they say, "I am not supplanting."

Nobody should get offended. It's part of what a grant is, and it's good to always have checks and balances and sometimes you might be wrong, right, that's why we put those letters out to make sure that they prove us wrong.

At the end of the day, we also respond to a higher authority to make sure that this board is responsible with the funds that are provided to every task force. So, yes, it does feel ugly to get those letters; but at the end of the day just to be able to create a response and make sure that we understand.

And for the commanders, right, I understand that we are cops. We don't know anything about this end. This is somebody else's job, but I do



urge every commander to understand what it is so that whenever we have a change of personnel or things that happen within our task forces, that that person that is the director or the project manager knows exactly what is going on to be able to document and even also take it further as even getting involved with the reimbursements, you know, whenever somebody promotes and there is a vacancy and you put that FTO back there, it makes a difference because two or three months will pass by; and you will have the money there that you can't be asking for reimbursement because nobody is there.

So what do we do, right, so we need to make sure that we understand those things as commanders to make sure that we also help our financial personnel within our counties or cities to understand what's going on with their task forces.

Yeah, definitely, Howard, I know that you are here. You are just reading off of your iPhone, but it is what it is, and it's for checks and balances. That's all that it is.

COMMANDER STINEHOUR: Yes, sir, thank you.

MEMBER BROTHERTON: Member Brotherton.

I have another question for Lauren.



Is the \$132,717.00, is that based on the matching that it was supposed to be or the matching that they were told because they were a new entity and they could be at 20 percent?

MS. WILLIAMS: This is all being sent again that was provided to us by Gina. I don't think that there is any adjustment to the match percentage from the system.

MR. PRICE: Dan Price, MVCPA grant manager for the record.

I believe Howard when he says that he was told that. I was not present. There was no writing that told him that. At the time, Joe Canady was managing the review of the grants; and he was trying to get people to reduce the match rate by 20 percent, so I don't know if there was another sentence or two in there that was in there saying move it to in-kind or not.

I know most of the people, again most of the grantees got the message that, yes, we want your cash match lowered; but we want the rest moved to in-kind, so I can't speak to that conversation; and I have no evidence of that conversation; but I also believe that there was a conversation between Joe Canady and the Burnet County Task Force about their



cash match; and I can't testify as to what was said because I have no direct knowledge.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Chief Rodriguez, if I may.

Williams Diggs, director MVCPA for the record.

I know that when one of the original letters went out, Sheriff Boyd reached out to me; and I made a trip up and sat down and visited with him; and he has been nothing but supportive of the MVCPA for the Heart of Texas Task Force working with us, working with Howard and then also the folks that work in the auditor's office and everything; and we decided that, you know, obviously Lauren and Dan could go up there and have a conversation.

So I did want to point out that Sheriff Boyd has been very accommodating and has worked very closely with us in this throughout this review.

COMMANDER STINEHOUR: Thank you for coming up also to meet with the sheriff. I appreciate that. That helps out a lot when they are in face-to-face meetings, so it's settling when the auditors are upset; and when Mr. Diggs showed up and met with the sheriff to try to calm their nerves because the sheriffs in my office is going, "Howard,



1 what's going on." I am on the end of this totem pole. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: We are cops; and we 2 don't know, right? 3 4 COMMANDER STINEHOUR: I appreciate them doing that. 5 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: I am about crime; but 6 7 this is something different, so I completely understand it. 8 9 Thank you, Director Diggs. 10 I appreciate it. 11 City of Eagle Pass. 12 CAPTAIN FUENTES: Good morning. 13 My name is Gerardo Fuentes. I am a 14 captain with the Eagle Pass Police Department. 15 the captain currently assigned as the grant manager 16 for the MVCPA grant. 17 First and foremost I would like to thank 18 the board and the director for the opportunity to 19 allow us to speak and for all of the support through 20 all of these years to be members of the MVCPA for a 21 very, very long time since this issue with the 22 applications back in '93. 23 There was an issue that was brought up to 24 our attention not too long ago about this possibility;



however, I have been speaking with the grant auditors

and with our finance personnel from the City of Eagle Pass. We were able to lower down some of the numbers that they were initially concerned about for the fiscal years 2021 and 2022 and 2023.

So there was some unreported expenditures that were found; and for that, I will pass over the microphone to our grant supervisor for the City of Eagle Pass who traveled down to explain to the board about this.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you.

MS. SAUCEDO: Good afternoon.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Good afternoon.

MS. SAUCEDO: If I may, I do have an explanation letter.

My name is Emily Saucedo. I am the grants specialist for the City of Eagle Pass.

I do have a letter of explanation for you all from our grants accountant who unfortunately couldn't be here today.

After talks with Ms. Williams, it was brought to our attention that the supplanting amount was \$11,592.47. Our grants accountant did review the numbers to see if there were any in-kind expenditures that were missed.

It turns out that there was just a couple

1 that I listed there on the second page. It's the first table. The total of those in-kind expenditures 2 did bring that initial \$11,000.00 down to \$9,915.47, 3 4 and the reason why there was less expenditures from the city from fiscal year '21 to '22 can be explained 5 in the graph below, and those expenditures does cover 6 7 the supplanting amount and should be the \$9,000.00. 8 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: It was mainly on 9 personnel? 10 MS. SAUCEDO: Yes. 11 MEMBER JONES: Are you sure? 12 MS. SAUCEDO: Yes. 13 CAPTAIN FUENTES: If I may, Mr. Chairman. 14 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Don't be nervous. Wе 15 are all family here. 16 CAPTAIN FUENTES: Initially, the 17 \$11,592.47 that was agreed upon that was for the 18 supplanting was able to be brought down to \$915,000.47 19 because of some unreported expenditures that were 20 found by our finance auditor; and the amount of 21 \$1,677.00 which brought it down to \$9,915.47; and upon 22 further review, you can go by our financial or health 23 insurance and some personnel increases in pay as part 24 of the annual or biannual cost of living expenses that



was not reported, some change in personnel that

1 retired and actually were making the very top scale of 2 their pay wage and were paid by a newer employee that 3 was making much less money. Initially it brought that down or up in 4 our part from \$9,915.00 to \$14,499.52. We still have 5 yet to -- that is part of what the finance grants 6 7 office and the financial department were working on, and we actually did have a meeting with them last week 8 9 just to sit down and discuss this issue. 10 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So, Lauren, you have 11 \$10,637.00; and, captain, you have \$14,000.00. 12 Is that the difference? 13 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes. 14 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: That's what you have, a 15 \$14,000.00 credit? 16 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes. 17 MEMBER BROTHERTON: You have a \$14,000.00 18 credit? 19 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: That's what you have, a 20 \$14,000.00 credit after you failed -- not failed --21 but there was no reimbursement? 22 The reimbursement part, is that what I am 23 getting? 24 CAPTAIN FUENTES: Yes, what we are saying is that it's like an -- if we look at the amount of 25



expenditures that was not reported, it initially brings it down to \$9,915.47; and then on the additional employee issues regarding the insurance and health insurance and the replacement of personnel, we went over that what's reimbursable or not. That's something that we have to discuss.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And that's where I am going that we would need to check on what would be reimbursable on those numbers.

MS. WILLIAMS: Correct.

Based on what I am seeing here, that reduced the supplanting amount to \$9,915.47. Those do seem like acceptable expenditures that I am comfortable with.

As far as everything below, it almost appears it looks like if we go to Ricardo Sanchez, the \$2,352.00, to Edgar Flores for \$1,753.00. It looks like those amounts are reducing so it appears to me that this is a rationale as to why there was less expenditures in FY22.

I don't know if I am following how this would -- how there is additional expenditures here. I think that this is -- if I am not mistaken -- might be a rationale as to why they spent less year over year more so than unreported expenditures.



1 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Did you want to say 2 something? 3 DIRECTOR DIGGS: Yes. William Diggs, MVCPA director for the 4 record. 5 So, Lauren, prior to right now, have you 6 seen these additional calculations? 7 MS. WILLIAMS: No. 8 9 DIRECTOR DIGGS: Okay, thank you. 10 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Are there any questions 11 for Eagle Pass? 12 MEMBER JONES: No. 13 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, captain. 14 Galveston County. LIEUTENANT BURROW: Colonel Lieutenant 15 16 Burrow with the Galveston County Auto Crimes Task 17 Force. 18 There are a couple of points that I want to make before we turn it over to Gina. She is going 19 20 to detail it out for you all. 21 One is back in -- and maybe Dan can 22 answer this -- why did they remove the fail safe from 23 the GTMS system that flagged this that was done by the 24 board; and if I remember correctly, chief, were you



the only one left on the board?

I mean, everybody else is new from that. It was a bill to keep the investigators, but that we didn't want to let go of all of our investigators at that time, and it was cut ten percent because of the second grant that continued, and that's when we moved into how we got into this mess.

The other one is the program income, whose program income does it belong to?

Does it belong to the task force?

Does it belong to MVCPA, so that's where we utilized that money.

The biggest thing is that going back to the original reason they removed the fail safe is to keep investigators and try to fund that stuff in there. The other is a lot of in-kind stuff that we tried to reduce down to I think it was 20 to make the reporting easier on us so that we don't have to remember all of this stuff.

So there is a lot of unreported stuff that's on these grants that the money is being spent by the county, but it's not being reported in the in-kind category.

I will turn it over to Gina.

MS. DOLITTLE: Gina Dolittle, Galveston County Gulf Coast Auto Crimes Task Force.



It's pretty simple. In '21 when we took the reduction statement -- the reduction in order to not lose a person, we chose to fund part of the salary on all of our operations out of the program income, and then ask the county or the city for any additional funding that we chose to write it in the grant application to fund the program income, and we did and that was in '21.

In '22 because when we applied for our grant applications always, we use our fringe and our benefits as the cash match. That's what we use. It's roughly 30 percent based off of the different benefit packages for each of the cities and the county; but when we use program income, it applies as cash match.

It established the baseline in '21 that we didn't spend in '22 and '23. We didn't budget using that much program income in '22 and '23, so it's pretty simple.

Overall we are talking about like \$25,000.00 over both of the years I think; and the difference is all there because, yes, \$24,000.00 to \$25,000.00 over both of the years; and so -- 24 one year, 25 the next or something like that; and so it's not a whole lot; but it's all due to program income; and I understand that there are task forces that



probably need to use their program income towards their 20 percent, the baseline; but we don't.

We use our fringe and benefits which is roughly 30 percent. We don't need it towards 20. I would like to review the option of allowing us to use program income going forth without it counting as penalizing us as cash match because if we don't use that same amount of cash match the following year using program income, we are supplanting; and that's what happened with us. We didn't spend as much because we didn't use as much program income.

It's pretty simple. I think that is, I mean, it really kind of sums it up.

Do you all disagree?

MS. WILLIAMS: No.

MS. DOLITTLE: I mean, we didn't spend as much because we didn't use as much program income.

MR. PRICE: Dan Price, MVCPA grant manager.

I think Gina is correct. We have gotten hooked on the use of program income especially with the increase in the 68A fees. To support a lot of our grantees, we actually have a number of grantees now that don't put any money in from their local general funds into the grant. They use program income to do



it, and there have been other task forces -- you know, Howard was up here a minute ago -- they have expressed that if their program income is diminished now that they are losing some of the 68A business to some of the other grantees that are re-opening, that's going to put a tremendous strain on the future-ability to be able to come up with a cash match to participate and continue with the MVCPA program.

So ultimately, it's kind of a ying and yang. A lot of people loved it and needed it; and it reduced the local demands; but at the same time, you know, they are now hooked on it; and it's going to be difficult to get the general fund funding back for these programs.

So I do agree with her that the program income can ultimately cause this issue, and I believe that is probably the case with Galveston as far as that goes.

Now, as far as what the state considers, MVCPA has always treated program income as our money. The state's position is that program income belongs to the state; and, in fact, the statute indicates that program income is to be used to offset grant expenses first and foremost. It would be put back into the program UB forward.



Before I got here, a year or two before I got here, the decision was taken by the board because many people were struggling with their local budgets to allow NICB at the time DPS and program income to be used as cash match, and so now it's kind of coming back up on the other side.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Well, I think the issue that we have on hand right now is the fact that we are using that program income to be able to sustain the grant; and so I strongly believe that every city and every county should be able to support the grant that is being offered to them or that they are being applied for, that they shouldn't put the strain on the task forces to come up with the money through 68A inspections to be able to support the grants.

I believe that it should be a win/win when it goes to these types of grants where the city is committed 100 percent and say, "Hey, we are going to support you 100 percent" -- or a county -- "Here is the 20 percent or here is however much we are applying for. We are applying for \$2 million, and we are going to give you \$400,000.00 from the general fund."

That should be the way to go with these types of grants because it gets very messy when we start looking into program income, and when we start



looking into other needs to put this grant in motion.

Again, the law has allowed for the program income. I strongly believe that we should continue pushing to develop that. The counties and cities should be able to -- if you are going to apply for a grant, you should be able to support this grant 100 percent. Whether it's 20 percent only, if that's the minimum that is required to apply for a grant, then so be it; but I just don't like the fact that we are putting that on our task forces to come up with the money through program income to support and add additional funds to it.

So I think we need to look at this a little bit more; but at the end of the day, the number is not substantial. So we will have additional conversations about this; but at this point, I strongly believe that we should continue not using program income to support the grants.

MR. PRICE: Dan Price, MVCPA grant auditor.

About six years ago, I had done an analysis of the local actual fund contributions to the grant. We will be happy to re-do that analysis today and provide that back to you at the next board meeting if that's what you would like.



CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Yes, please, thank you.

Thank you, Gina.

Harris County.

MR. SCHMIDT: I thank you for the opportunity to address this committee.

My name is Brian Schmidt. I am the Harris County Sheriff's Office grants manager, and I am joined by Jasmine Gonzales and Felix Boutra, and they are both grant analysts on this grant.

I also wanted to convey to you that Lieutenant Johnny Gonzales who handles our auto theft grant, he is on his way here. He was at a funeral for an officer who was just murdered and so he was hoping to make it in time, but he is actually en route right now.

So anyway, I want to tell you first of all that we take supplanting very seriously. We have 30 active grants; and we have had 30 active grants for many years; and during that time, we have never been accused of supplanting. We have undergone many audits and never in an audit has anybody found evidence of supplanting, so we take this concern seriously.

I think the way to start this conversation is to -- I know that you have been kind of bombarded with numbers; and they can get confusing,



so I am going to try to make this as simple as I can.

In fiscal year 2023, we received a grant from MVCPA of \$853,000.00. There is also a 20 percent cash match requirement, so that's about \$188,000.00, okay. So in addition to the grant amount and the cash match amount, we provided an in-kind match amount of \$1,786,000.00.

So our in-kind match far exceeded the grant amount or the required cash match amount. So basically what we are doing is we are putting our own money towards this program to an extent that it's way beyond anything that we are getting from the grant. So I think what that does is it's fixed to our commitment to this program. We are putting a lot of resources towards this program.

Now, it is true that we didn't actually expend the full amount of our in-kind match, and there are reasons for that, and they basically can be boiled down to vacancies. So during this time period, we have experienced a lot of vacancies.

We have some handouts that we can give to you if you would like to see them; but essentially what happened is people quit, people get promoted, they get transferred. We actually had an officer who was killed. He was an auto theft investigator who was



killed on the job. You know, various things happen; but each officer gets paid about \$100,000.00; and so that's salary and benefits; and so when you have a vacancy over a period of time, you don't spend money quickly.

You know, the vacancy savings accumulate quickly; and when you see in your handout there that we had a shortfall in our in-kind spending of about \$450,000.00 per year, that's four positions, you know, and that happens.

We are trying to fill these positions. It's not like we are not trying, but I don't want you to go away from here thinking that Harris County doesn't think that auto theft is unimportant because that's not the case at all. We are not intentionally shifting money away from auto theft. It's just that when we have vacancies, we are trying to fill them; but it takes a long time.

Another thing that happens is when people retire, a senior level person retires, they are replaced by a junior level person who doesn't make quite as much money; and so even if we do fill those vacancies, they are not going to -- the new person is not going to be making as much money as the old person made just because he is coming in at a little bit



lower level.

So there are various things that sort of almost require that we are not going to make our full match amount because vacancies are just part of the cost of doing business. It's the reality of Harris County. We are a very large agency. We have people coming and going all of the time so it's almost impossible for us to meet our in-kind amount because people are always coming and going.

But I think the main thing that I want you to recognize is that we are providing a humongous amount of in-kind match; and so, you know, this conversation began with the idea of what should we do to make supplanting right; and the chairman suggested that maybe we should -- you guys should require that these grant agencies return the money; but it's our money that we were not spending. It's not your money, and it's not the cash match amount.

It's in-kind money that we voluntarily provided to show our commitment to this program; and unfortunately, we didn't spend it all; but we are trying to spend it all. We have -- Jasmine and Felix can speak to this, but we have asked our command staff to replace these vacant positions over and over again, and it's not that they are not committed to the



program either. They are trying to fill these positions but just haven't, you know, keep up with the constant turn in these positions.

I would like to kind of conclude by asking you what you would recommend for us to do in terms of filling the vacancies because that's essentially what this boils down to is unfilled positions; and so, I mean, I would like to hear what ideas you have.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: All right.

MS. WILLIAMS: I just wanted to kind of expand. I have pulled up the calculations in front of me, and I will say that we worked -- Lauren Williams, MVCPA grant auditor.

They did end up providing us with some unreported expenditures, so these numbers are updated to reflect that; but just to give you all a little bit more context and provide you with the concrete numbers.

In FY21, their match was \$1,336,610.00 which was reduced to \$212,763.00 in FY22, but it is important to know in addition that that in-kind amount increased substantially so the match was much lower but in-kind went from \$748,943,000.00 reported in FY21 up to \$1 million -- as you discussed -- \$330,602.68 in



FY22.

So the grant amount did increase from FY21 to FY22 and FY23 and MVCPA expenditures increased while the total local spend of Harris County did decrease for whatever reasons those may be; but that's why, I guess, I wanted to explain a little bit as far as why the in-kind amount increased so much. They are making up to a degree for the drop in match year over year, cash match.

MR. SCHMIDT: Can I just comment on that?

We were trying to right size our cash
match. I mean, the grant requires a 20 percent cash
match; and so we used to provide these giant cash
match; and then we thought to ourselves, that's
unnecessary. Like, why don't we just provide the
right amount, so that's why we brought it down to
20 percent; and like Lauren said, then we made up for
it by adding this, you know, very large in-kind match
amount.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: The in-kind match, that's the area that you are having problems with in filling those spots?

MR. SCHMIDT: That's correct.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So last year how much of in-kind did you -- were you able to save in not



1 putting those FTEs or being able to hire those FTEs? 2 How much did the city -- or how much did the county end up spending in in-kind in total? 3 4 MS. GONZALES: Jasmine Gonzales, grants analyst HCSO. 5 So for in-kind fiscal year '22 we spent 6 7 1.3. The same for fiscal year '23. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And the reimbursement 8 9 from MVCPA was how much? 10 MS. WILLIAMS: Lauren Williams. 11 It was \$853,100.00. The year-to-date 12 expenditures were matched by that total. 13 So for '22 you still CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: 14 spent -- going back to Harris County -- you still 15 spent 1.3 million for -- to pay FTEs that are assigned 16 to auto theft, correct? 17 MR. SCHMIDT: Yeah, I believe that's 18 correct. I mean, I don't have the exact number; but 19 essentially we are spending the same amount of money 20 each year with some small variations; but our 21 commitment to the program hasn't changed. It's about 22 the same each year. 23 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So where is where we 24 have the issue, Lauren, for that?



MS. WILLIAMS: I am calculating right

now.

Lauren Williams.

So if we add the total local expenditures of their match, cash match in FY21 as well as their in-kind in FY21 and then take the difference of their total local expenditures in comparison to FY22, that's where we are getting the \$542,000.00 difference. So their total contributions year over year was reduced by these amounts that you are seeing here.

So, you know, their total local spent, although their in-kind did increase substantially, it did not increase in proportion to the amount that their cash match decreased. There is still a very substantial difference.

MR. PRICE: Dan Price, MVCPA grant manager.

I think what we are missing here is that in FY21, that was the high watermark; and from FY21 to FY22 when the cash match was reduced, their total local spending was reduced by just under half a million dollars; and then they maintained that level into '23. So they have dropped half a million dollars from '21 to '22 and continued to spend that lower level in '23.

MR. SCHMIDT: So just to comment on that.



We added we sent them some
documentation showing other types of expenditures that
had not previously been reported to the MVCPA and
these would include fuel costs and other deputies from
different units that are helping the auto theft unit
and our other operations when we do like SWAT,
sometimes they help auto theft with investigations.
So we sent all of those numbers to them; and it added
about \$100,000.00 per year, so that's why it goes from
half a million down to \$400,000.00 in short fall in
our in-kind spending per year; and I also want to
acknowledge that Lieutenant Gonzales just arrived from
the funeral. He is our auto theft commander.
CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So we are adding that
cost on the additional support from those auxiliary
units to the grant?
MR. SCHMIDT: Yeah, we sent that to them.
They have that.
CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Is that something that
we can accept as an expenditure?
MS. WILLIAMS: Lauren Williams.
They are reflected here in your board
book, all those additional expenses.
Was that your question?



CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Yeah, I mean, are those

expenses that we can accept as expenses?

MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, they were all good.

We accepted those numbers and reflected them here in our board book.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay, but we are still with that same number?

MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, so originally their supplanting calculation for FY22 was \$542,000.00 and in FY23 it was 506. That has now been reduced due to their additional unreported expenditures to \$473,859.82 in FY22 and \$450,489.43 in FY23 according to this in reported expenditures.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So if somebody uses the SWAT team to assist their auto theft task force, where do you put that number or where does it reflect on the grant?

MR. PRICE: Dan Price, MVCPA grant manager for the record.

What we asked them to do is they are allowed to provide any reasonable and necessary expenses to support the grant, but they have to also do so consistently. So if they tell us, "Oh, by the way, we spent \$200,000.00 or \$100,000.00 on gas in '22," we say, "Okay. That's great. What did you pay for gas for the task force in '21," because we have to



be consistent from year to year. That's a basic account in time.

So they are allowed if there is a one-time expense or if they go out and buy vehicles or contribute to vehicles or anything that they do as long as they are reporting that expenditure consistently between the years, we will accept it if it's reasonable and necessary.

MS. WILLIAMS: Lauren Williams.

I don't believe that there were any expenses that were provided to us that we did not accept or reflect here.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: I am just saying that there might be some task forces that are not putting that in their grants that they are using auxiliary units to support units from their PDs or their sheriff departments and sending them your way. That's where I am at with this.

MR. PRICE: Dan Price, MVCPA grant manager.

So it's an interesting discussion.

For in-kind match, we traditionally have not had a high level of review of in-kind expenses.

We do review them but not at a high level. There are many grantees who honestly because of their local



political situations don't want to actually reflect the amount that they are spending on our grant, and so they will choose to omit in-kind altogether, and that was the case.

That's why we went out and asked people what were your in-kind expenses for our records so that we can test it to see if, in fact, they were spending in-kind amounts or they had shifted to in-kind amounts that would allow us to say the local spent maintained the same.

But I would say probably eight or nine years ago, it was decided that although we wanted to capture all of the expenditures for all of the grantees so we could report it to the legislature, many of them politically just aren't able to reflect the true cost that they used to support this grant.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: It seems to me that, you know, when you file your return, do you go the long way or the short way, itemize or not itemize; and I think some are doing one or the other.

I think we definitely need to figure out what we are going to do here; and again, I am going to go back to the same as the other task forces that there needs to be additional conversations as to what we are going to do because you are asking for



recommendations.

I think that we need to look in depth into other major task forces and then I will say, you know, like Dallas and Houston, how are they, you know, trying to mitigate this; and we kind of figure out how they are doing it because I know for a fact that they are also having problems with personnel and getting personnel in their police departments or sheriff departments.

So definitely have a conversation with them; and then kind of figure out what is the best way to approach this especially when you are having trouble putting FTEs into your program; and making sure that this doesn't happen again; and that's pretty much what this board is responsible for is that it doesn't continue; and that we understand that, you know, sometimes you are going to have those -- that red tape; and we just need to find a way and a solution for it not to continue.

So, yes.

MEMBER BROTHERTON: I think you said that -- tell me your name again.

I am Charla Brotherton for the record.

MR. SCHMIDT: My name is Brian Schmidt.

MEMBER BROTHERTON: Okay, Brian.



You said -- and my brain has hit on it two or three times -- you guys have had many many grants. Over the years you have had many many grants, and that you have not had a problem with any of the other grants.

So that, you know, I don't like to be singled -- I don't want us to be the group that gets singled out to be the one, right, so do you have a reason for why the other grants are not having a problem with it or why it's this one?

Is there something that's different about all of the other grants in your reporting to them versus reporting to us, or do you have to report to them or just a differentiation between them and us?

MR. SCHMIDT: Okay. I think MVCPA is taking a different interpretation of the supplanting prohibition than other agencies take.

Lieutenant Gonzales is here, and he was going to speak regarding the vacancies and his efforts to fill those positions.

I know that he arrived late, but would you mind if he were to speak to you about that?

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Lieutenant.

LIEUTENANT GONZALES: Good afternoon.

For the record, John Gonzales, lieutenant

Harris County Sheriff's Office Auto Theft.

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I apologize for my tardiness. I was just attending a funeral. I am not sure what has been covered so if I hit on something twice, I apologize in advance.

So when I inherited this, I understand that these -- when this came to fruition, this was from '21 to '22, '22 to '23. It's clearly known that I inherited this problem. I inherited the task force's responsibility in April of 2023, and I inherited with vacancies on our in-kind side.

Upon this immediately coming forth, I lowered the amount of our personnel on the in-kind side from 13 to nine. I believe between Brian, Jasmine and I, we estimated the math to be right at about with the salary, fringe, fuel cost and so forth at about \$100,000.00.00 per investigator.

Since I have started, I have lost seven personnel. That's been to promotions, transfers, terminations, resignations and, you know, so forth. Ι am sure from '21 to '22, those numbers increased.

We had pulled some numbers, and this is just overall. Again, if they have already covered this, I apologize.

From December 31st of 2020 our entire



department's personnel HR numbers were 5,093 personnel. That number significantly dropped on June 30th of 2021 to 5,041. The fiscal year '22, June 30th, that number dropped to 4,584. Now, at the end of fiscal year '23, that number now sits at 4,543, so we have lost.

You know, we are hemorrhaging; and it's difficult to speak on behalf of our command staff even though that's essentially what I am doing here today. I am in the seat. I will own it. The buck stops with me, but I send out weekly reports to our command staff of vacancies within our unit.

Our department is hemorrhaging personnel; and obviously with the rise in violent crime in Harris County, our command staff made the decision to reallocate personnel and resources to add additional squads to our homicide or violent crime units. As I mentioned just earlier, I just attended a funeral of a fallen officer as a result of that.

So with that being said -- and I am not trying to make light of the situation; but when it comes to numbers, that's why I asked Brian and Jasmine to come up here because it all reads hieroglyphics to me. I simply tell my command staff what I need, what it does and what is costs essentially like I do with



you all.

So that's all that I have. If you all have any other questions, I will be more than happy to attempt to answer those even though this again occurred before I got here.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, lieutenant, for that explanation; and we talked about this before where, you know, we understand that there is going to be some chiefs and some sheriffs that are going to be moved to the resources where that are needed, you know, across the board in every agency; and we understand that; but what we want to get to is that they understand the fact that on our side, we have to reduce the -- if there is going to be a reduction in personnel, that we do a reduction in the amount of grant funds that we are providing from the state and that's just on our side.

Our responsibility is to make sure that does happen as well that we don't keep the same amount of grant funded monies there when there has been a significant reduction in personnel towards other crimes because at the end of the day, the commission is very clear that it's auto theft and auto burglaries and not catalytic converters.

So I think if it's needed for us -- and



this is why I think these letters are always good so that the command staff can also be aware that, hey, you know what, this is going on in the auto theft area; and we understand that there is going to be a need for more attention whether it's personnel or if there is going to be a significant reduction in property crime, it's not going to be a priority for the agency; and we understand, right; but we understand also -- and we just talked about it last night -- about the nexus that it has to violent crime, the nexus that it could be, you know, Houston has a big problem. Harris County has a big problem in auto thefts.

So if we don't prioritize it as well with violent crimes, you know, then it's okay. We understand, but we need to reduce the amount of grant funds that are going to be provided to the agencies.

So like I had told Brian here that we are going to have to continue the conversation here because we need Harris County and we need Houston PD to make sure that they are also with our mission of reducing the amount of auto thefts in the State of Texas because the biggest numbers are here. I mean, everybody knows it. We are not going to shy away from that. Houston always comes up in the big picture



that, hey, this is where the auto thefts are happening.

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So we are going to have to continue this conversation and making sure that we continue the conversation with Director Diggs and Lauren here and them to make sure that we come to an agreement that again if we are going to reduce the amount of personnel, that we reduce the amount of grant funds that are provided to Harris County; but if we are going to try to bring up the personnel numbers; and it's just a waiting time, you know, a waiting period to make sure that we put those FTEs back in place, then we will try to figure something out so that we can accommodate for that; but I think it's important for you to make sure that you provide your command staff and your sheriff with the information and as well as for our responsibility to make sure that we go back to our staff in making sure that they provide to you the needed support that is needed for the grant application and things like that moving forward.

But again, we will have additional conversations; and then we will circle back with you through Lauren and through Daniel and Director Diggs in making sure that we figure out this supplanting issue that we have; and I know that it might be a



different -- like you said, it's just the way that we are looking at it. Let's look at it more in depth and find out where we can go from here.

LIEUTENANT GONZALES: For the record John Gonzales.

Also, Board Member Brotherton, I know that you asked a question earlier. I was -- I wouldn't say eavesdropping. I was sitting right there -- but you asked how this grant was different from others. So I don't have quite the grant experience that they do.

I started working with grants as a sergeant back when I was assigned to our Homeland Security Bureau, and a lot of the grants -- I am not sure if you have heard of them -- I have dealt with UASI, SHSP and PSGP; and just from my perspective from my seat where you all differ from them is those grants, we use those more for equipment grants. It was pretty much a one and done.

This one here as opposed to paying for overtime, personnel, salaries, I don't want to say it makes it more complex; but it's new to me. I like and I see the need for it.

In my opinion, that's where it, you know, it -- because we deal with vacancies. It's not so



much as it's equipment being used or did you get this equipment. It's where is this personnel, and also for the record.

When I took over, the fiscal year '24 application was pretty much already said and done by my predecessor. It was just, you know, I didn't know really what year I was looking at but fiscal year '25 was the first one that I actually had a hand in actually authoring, you know, with my own numbers; and that's when again all of this came to fruition. I said, okay, well, let's at least lower our in-kind personnel from the 13 to nine to close that deficit in an attempt to, you know, be in compliance.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: That's exactly what we were talking about earlier, you know, that this is a grant that grants, you know, FTEs, equipment, overtime, so it's different because I think every agency that's here, you know, understands that this grant allows for a lot of things to be included in the grant.

So again, yes, I think that the issue here is always that the FTE, how much in-kind cash match, you know, it gets a little bit difficult to understand; but -- were you gong to say something?

MEMBER JONES: Lieutenant, thank you for



the explanation.

Mr. Schmidt, you asked the board to give recommendations for recruiting. That's not the purpose of this board.

I do have a question for you though.

You mentioned there are vacancies, and they are being allocated by others outside of your control. We understand that.

When those personnel are re-allocated elsewhere, where is the funding for those personnel re-allocated?

MR. SCHMIDT: Well, first I would say that it's not necessarily the case that people are being re-allocated away. It's just that people quit. People leave the sheriff's office employment. You know, there is a lot of reasons. It's not like our command staff is saying, "You know what, auto theft is not that important anymore. Let's move all of our people over to somewhere else." That's not what is happening.

MEMBER JONES: I understand that.

So when someone retires, resigns, gets fired, they are no longer there, where is the money that was allocated to that position, where does that go?



MR. SCHMIDT: It doesn't get spent. If the position is not filled, it doesn't get spent. That's why we are having these shortfalls. It's the sheriff's office -- in other words, if a position is not filled, the money is not spent. It's not like we are moving money elsewhere. We only get money from our budget office for people for filled position.

MEMBER JONES: Correct, so which goes back to the chairman's point of reduction. If the positions are not there, then reduce.

MR. SCHMIDT: And that's what we are trying to do. That's what the lieutenant was alluding to in our application that we just submitted. We are trying to right size our in-kind amount so that it reflects reality in terms of how many positions are actually filled rather than our hopes.

So like, for example, we -- I think we had 17 investigators as part of our in-kind match in the years in question; but we were not able to keep all 17 positions filled; and so probably we should have taken more of a realistic approach and said, "You know what, we have 17 positions allocated for this unit; but in reality, we probably are only going to be able to fill 15 of them," because there is always going to be some people coming and going.



So we should have just budgeted for 15 in our in-kind match instead of the full 17; but we were trying to, you know, provide the full scope of our investment in auto theft to use so you would know how much money we are spending.

We didn't know that we would be held responsible for that number, you know, to be held liable for the amount of our own money that we didn't spend. That just seems kind of like silly to me because this is our money. This is our in-kind match.

But anyway going forward, we will probably try to not say we have 17 positions budgeted to us or allocated to us from our budget office and we think all 17 of them are going to be filled because that's not realistic, right, because always there are people coming and going.

So maybe what we should just do is tell you we have 17 positions allocated, but really we are going to fill 15 of them, and so that gives us a little cushion to make room for the fact that people will leave employment with Harris County.

Does that make sense?

I think that could be a solution to solve this problem.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And again, you know, it



could be a solution; and I believe we have always, you know, talked about it that we can pour -- you know, if Harris County or Houston PD would say, "You know what, I am going to have a 20 percent match on a \$5 million grant to fund prosecutors, fund more investigators, fund more equipment to make sure that we reduce the amount of crimes in Houston," we will be all for it because if we attack the problem in Houston, we will probably reduce 30 percent of auto thefts.

So this is where the commitment of MVCPA is; but at the end of the day, it has to be coming also a commitment from the agencies, right, so, you know, we are all for trying to make sure that the mission continues to reduce the amount of auto thefts.

Midland and Odessa is another problem.

The Lubbock area is another problem. Amarillo, it's a problem; but the biggest problem continues to be Harris and Houston, so you know, we are going to be one hundred percent in support of you and Harris County and the Houston PD all of the time; but we also need for your to support the commission in the Motor Vehicle Crime Prevention Authority to make sure that we continue to provide that safety for the communities that we live in.

MR. SCHMIDT: I mean, our command staff



would have been here, I think, if it had not been for the funeral; but I know that they are committed to this; and the lieutenant can speak to that. Our commitment to auto theft has not waned. It's a priority for us for sure.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And it's going to be tough having less personnel trying to get to reduce the number of auto thefts. It's going to be tough for you. You know, I have been there; and it's tough. So, you know, just putting that awareness there.

LIEUTENANT GONZALES: I inherited an issue; but, you know, like I said, there are small things that I have been doing to rectify that and mitigate, you know, the loss of personnel; but, you know, it's just, you know, it's -- and like Brian said, our command staff has been tied up with everything going on recently with the storm and so forth; but, you know, to piggyback off of what he said about just lowering, you know, the amount of personnel within I guess realistic expectations.

We are -- and not to single anybody out here. I know that I am on record; but I am told week after week; and I am honestly surprised that I haven't been moved yet because I am constantly telling, "Hey, I have got positions that need to be filled. Hey, I



need personnel; and I get told the empty promise that we are going to get you some help. We are going to get you some personnel.

And from my understanding, Jasmine maybe can comment more on this; but a few years back, our command staff -- this is before I even came to auto theft -- significantly decreased personnel I want to say mid cycle with I believe that was back when you all were ABTPA; and it kind of made some -- you know, ruffled some feathers; and so that was, you know, another, you know, thing that I was like, well, you know, if we can do this mid grant cycle with the, you know, transfer personnel or whatnot, you know; but definitely I understand what you are saying; and Brian does, too. We are all on the same page, and we will make it right.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And again, we will probably get creative, right, so I suggest that the recommendation is, hey, get the surrounding cities and municipalities that are in Harris County to come onboard with you; and get that 20 percent from those cites and those towns I think because there was a town here that came in and said that they were part of the Harris County area.

So was it a town, Sharon?



It was a city, right?

MEMBER JONES: It was a city.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: It was a city.

There was a couple of cities that came in for the SB224 that were in Harris County.

DIRECTOR DIGGS: I believe half in Galveston County and half in Harris if I am not mistaken, yes.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: So I think just looking at those cities maybe just bring in the body to kind of help out with the task force. That would be something that can be done.

and this is just a vision for the next fiscal year.

Everybody knows how this goes -- we have eight constable precincts that, you know, our officer that was just killed a week prior was part of a task force for violent offenders. It was called VIPER, and it was composed of the Harris County Sheriff's Office and the Harris County Constable Precincts' personnel from all eight precincts.

And I have a vision for something like that with auto theft just to see who wants to play ball or whatnot. So that's definitely something that is, you know, in the chamber.



CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Great.

MEMBER JONES: Just something to

consider.

If you have 17 positions and you only have 15 bodies, apply for 15. When you get the other one or two when you have 16 or 17, come back and request to fill those positions; and then you don't have this problem. So it doesn't seem silly.

MR. PRICE: Dan Price, MVCPA grant manager for the record.

I also wanted to point out that obviously they are not the only people struggling with us, but what other people are doing and we have talked a lot this week about force multipliers.

We have talked specifically about a lot of LPRs and there are a lot of people who have vacancies; and they will do a grant adjustment; and they will say, "Okay. I don't have the same number of people. Maybe I can gain some advantage by adding LPRs or other equipment or shifting those expenses somewhere else where they are needed;" and we give people every opportunity to do that.

The other issue that he had referenced before he got here. I was here for that; and part of the problem was that some grantees we know that our

investigators are highly trained. We spend a lot of time and a lot of money on training our investigators, and people need the opportunity to advance in their careers, but there have been situations where some of our grantees have literally decapitated their programs by moving all of the experienced investigators to other areas and narcotics comes to mind, and then they are bringing in new recruits.

So when there is a concern, we do not allow them to replace a sergeant with a Rookie B Cop that is being assigned to auto theft. That is a concern for us; and so, you know, again, it's not just the number of people but the quality of people on our task forces that we need to maintain.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Okay. Are there any other questions?

Thank you.

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MR. SCHMIDT: Thank you.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: City of Pasadena; and the last statement from you, Dan.

I think it's that we will leave it up to the agencies moving them into narcotics and moving them to promotions. That's out of our control; but we do ask for them to put in a new body even if it's sometimes commanders prefer a brand new investigator



1 so that they can mold them the way that they want to, 2 right; and sometimes it pays dividends, right, so we will leave it up to the agency. 3 4 The City of Pasadena, good morning. Well, I am sorry, good afternoon. 5 already 1:00. 6 SERGEANT BUCKERT: 7 I am Doug Buckert. am a sergeant of our auto theft task force joined by 8 9 Nancy Mata, our financial officer, who has our 10 adjusted calculations. 11 May I ask, what are the numbers that we have submitted to you for our supplanting figures 12 13 because we submitted these in March? 14 They are updated. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Did you give them 15 16 copies? 17 SERGEANT BUCKERT: Yes. 18 It's been updated I believe. It's updated. 19 SERGEANT BUCKERT: Their 20 numbers reflects this. 21 So since Pasadena Auto Crimes Task Force 22 became a grantee, we have been comprised of six 23 investigators and one sergeant. 24 However, in April of 2022, one of our



in-kind investigators promoted to the rank of sergeant

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and vacated this position. This personnel move left us with five investigators and one sergeant; and due to personnel issues and shortages on our patrol staff, our position for in-kind investigator was not filled between April of 2022; and January of this year I finally got it filled.

So we are back up to six investigators, five in-kind investigators and myself as a sergeant is listed as in-kind.

We have one grant funded position that we meet at that 80/20 cash match; and I believe the figures that you see before you for FY22, the \$5,623.14, I will let Nancy speak to that exact number; but I am not a math whiz; but I think that falls within the five percent allowance for that year; and the figure of \$126,534.00, that is reflected of that vacant investigator position and salary and then fringe benefits just not being there for that year.

I do want to make it known, too, I started in the position in November of 2022. I was brand new to this. I was tasked with revamping; and as Dan said, gutting our unit. I replaced three senior investigators with guys with ten years or less experience. So there is a paid scale difference there that would be reflected.



1 Now, I have done everything that I could 2 to get that sixth position added back. We finally got it. After our patrol numbers came back up, they did 3 allocate that position. 4 So I don't know if you all have any questions for Nancy. 6 7 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Did you have this prior to your conversations with the City of Pasadena? 8 9 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, they provide this a 10 few months ago at this point. 11 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: And we are still at the 12 same number? 13 MS. WILLIAMS: Yes, correct. 14 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Thank you. 15 SERGEANT BUCKERT: Thank you. 16 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Your recommendation. 17 DIRECTOR DIGGS: Williams Diggs, MVCPA 18 Director for the record. 19 Mr. Chairman and members, you know, in 20 light of some additional information that has been 21 provided today by at least four of the seven, I 22 believe that the MVCPA auditing has done their due 23 diligence dating back into March to gather as much 24 information about the issues of supplanting.



We have heard Lauren speak earlier.

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Originally, I think there were 12 or 13 through lots of conversations, lots of back and forth, that was reduced to the seven that have been here and presented today; and then here today, we have gotten even additional information.

I, myself, wanted to show some leniency to some of the task forces. I wanted to speak publicly about that. I believe it can be complicated at times. I believe the rule though is clear that we are not supposed to supplant. I have even had a conversation with Dan. The word just sounds terrible, right; but at the same time, it is what it is; and so with that, I make the following recommendation.

Instead of leaving three of the task forces hanging until a later date or until a later board meeting, I believe we go ahead and take the following action.

I believe the City of Beaumont should pay 25 percent of the overall amount that is shown in my calculations -- and, somebody, please, check my math -- is that the City of Beaumont repay the MVCPA \$56,435.66.

I believe that Burnet County should repay 25 percent of the \$132,717.00, which would be \$33,179.48.



And that the City of Pasadena should pay 25 percent of their total and that amount would be \$31,387.42.

I believe that the City of Brownsville

I believe that the City of Brownsville should be further reviewed.

The City of Eagle Pass should be further reviewed.

Galveston County further reviewed.

Harris County further reviewed.

But yet we move forward on the three that I mentioned. I don't believe that there is any reason for us to hold up making some formal action today and move forward and provide them with some, you know, with some relief.

Let's get this behind us; and that we also for MVCPA staff the audit team for the next couple of years that they quarterly take a close look at the City of Beaumont, Burnet County and the City of Pasadena and provide me with a report just to see where we stand as far as expenditures and reporting.

And so that would be my recommendation to the board today, sir.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: What was the recommendation for Harris County, further review?

DIRECTOR DIGGS: Harris County that we



have further review of some information that they have 1 2 provided and that we look closer at their in-kind match and some other things. As far as the 3 4 maintaining these in-kind levels, I think that there needs to be some further conversation. 5 MR. RICHARDS: Mr. Chairman. 6 7 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Go ahead. MR. RICHARDS: David Richards, general 8 9 counsel for the record. Director Diggs, with respect to those 10 that you have identified as moving forward on, do you 11 12 have a time period in mind within which they would be 13 required to pay or repay -- I should say -- the 14 amounts that you have identified? 15 DIRECTOR DIGGS: Williams Diggs, MVCPA 16 Direct for the record. 17 Absolutely, Mr. Richards. 18 I, myself, don't believe that they should 19 have to pay us all in one payment. I believe that it 20 could be quarterly payments over the next 12 months 21 and that they could pay those dollar amounts due. 22 MR. RICHARDS: Thank you. 23 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Does the quarterly 24 reports, are they going to be directed to you,



Director Diggs, or are they going to be for -- are

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they going to be for two years?

How many years are we talking about?

One year?

DIRECTOR DIGGS: For the payments of what was owed, yes, for one year; but for the continued review of what is actually occurring behind the scenes when it comes to the management when it comes to the financials, that would be for two years that I would want to see those quarterly documents for my audit team for the next couple of years.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: The only thing that I would like to recommend is that I know that there was some information brought in today; and, you know, the letters were sent on 3/15.

From here on, I think this is a lesson learned, right, that every time that we send a letter, we expect for the agency or the grantee to respond. They almost had four months, to respond within the three months. I think that's very doable and to kind of put in a sense the urgency that the minute that they receive the letter for whatever the question is from MVCPA.

So I think this is the first that we do for auditing on the supplanting part. I know that we are going on '22 '23; but from here on, every time



that we send a letter out that we make sure that they engage with a response; and we request a response if they receive that letter and that they will be working on it and make sure on that letter it states that they have that amount of time to respond and that they keep Director Diggs as well, you know, in those conversations. Yeah, but we definitely need to keep on tracking these kinds of actions.

Is there anyone on the board who wants to make a motion, or are we going to go with Charla?

MEMBER BROTHERTON: Member Brotherton.

I make a motion that we go with the recommendation and that Beaumont, Burnet County and Pasadena pay 25 percent over the next year based on quarterly payments; and that everyone else goes into a review program to be updated by our next meeting.

CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: The probation, on the two-year probation -- oh, what did you call it -- the two-year review?

MS. WILLIAMS: Two-year review.

MEMBER BROTHERTON: Member Brotherton.

And we add that the Beaumont, Burnet and Pasadena will be under quarterly review for two years.

MEMBER CANTU-SERRANO: Member

Cantu-Serrano, I second.



1 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: All right. I have a 2 motion from Member Brotherton, and I have a second from Member Cantu-Serrano. 3 4 Is there any further discussion? Hearing none, I will now call for the 6 vote. 7 Members, if you are in favor of the motion say, "Aye." 8 MEMBER CANTU-SERRANO: Aye. 10 MEMBER BROTHERTON: Aye. 11 MEMBER JONES: Aye. 12 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Any opposed? 13 Let the record reflect that, I, Michael 14 Rodriguez, vote aye. 15 The motion passes. 16 On to Agenda Item 12, 68A inspection 17 proposed statutory change awareness. 18 We did that? 19 MEMBER JONES: Yes. 20 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Oh, yeah, we are past No. 12 to 13. 21 22 Somebody is hungry. 23 We are going to skip Agenda Item 14. 24 There is no closed session. 25 And 15.



1 DIRECTOR DIGGS: There is nothing on 2 that. 3 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Agenda Item No. 17, 4 adjournment. Members, unless there is any further 5 business, I will entertain a motion to adjourn the 6 7 meeting. MEMBER BROTHERTON: Member Brotherton, I 8 9 do something -- let's see. 10 I suggest that we adjourn. CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: Do I have a second? 11 12 MEMBER CANTU-SERRANO: Member 13 Cantu-Serrano, I second. 14 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: I have a motion from 15 Member Brotherton and a second from Member 16 Cantu-Serrano. 17 Any further discussion? 18 Hearing none, I will now call for the 19 vote. All those in favor adjourning say, "Aye." 20 21 MEMBER CANTU-SERRANO: Aye. 22 MEMBER BROTHERTON: Aye. 23 MEMBER JONES: Any. 24 CHAIR RODRIGUEZ: All those oppose say, 25 "Nay."
